Evezich Elected Independent Prexy

Pete Evezich was elected president of the Independents at an election last month. Tippy Smith, president of the Artemisia-Manzanita association, was elected vice president; Deanna Merling was elected secretary; Jerry Berry was elected treasurer, and Ransome Richards will be the sergeant-at-arms. The delegates will participate in seminars, round-table discussions dealing with different topics, evening programs, including a New Year's Eve party, and recreation.

ALVAREZ SPEAKS TO NEWSMEN AT SAN FRANCISCO MEETING

"Progress is being made against three major problems of Latin-American newspapers—censorship, education of the people, and finances," said Ed Alvarez, a senior journalism major at Nevada, before 75 leading publishers in San Francisco recently.

He said that Latin American newspapers are following in the footsteps of the U. S. press, and hope to catch up very soon.

Alvarez is the grandson of a leading publisher and editor in Mexico. His grandfather, J. Alva-

rez Del Castillo, is publisher and editor of "El Informador" of Guadalajara.

"Mexico has complete freedom of the press today," said Alvarez, but added that this was not always true and is not true of all Latin America. Cuba and Paraguay, among others, "are not as fortunate as we are," he said.

He told the publishers that the United States has set an example of press freedom for the rest of the hemisphere, but cautioned that "it takes more than a leader to end press censorship."

AWS Christmas Singers Visit Reno Hospitals

Three hospitals in the Reno-Sparks area were serenaded Monday evening by forty to fifty women participating in the annual AWS Christmas caroling.

The caroling began at the Veteran's Administration hospital, where the women sang from the stage in the hospital's auditorium.

The carolers then went to the Sparks Mental hospital, and then sang on the steps of St. Mary's hospital.

There were five soloists. Sopranos were Bonnie Ford and Betty Ohrman, alto was Evelyn Beal, professional concert singer from New York, tenor was Joseph Battaglia, and Chalmers Musgrove was bass. With the exception of Miss Beal, all the soloists were local and all have had considerable training.

The journalism department has been collecting books in various fields of journalism to send to the state institution.

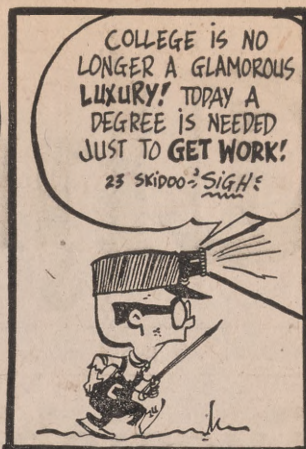
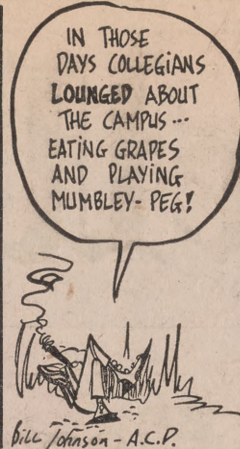
Independent Social To Be Held January 3

were entered in the junior men's division and won two out of four debates.

Joseph was selected for the finals in Interpretation. Miss Burgess entered the Oratory contest and Miss Eberle entered Extemporaneous Speaking.

The tournament was attended by more than 400 persons representing over 50 schools of the western states.

What Makes Boxer Tick? Here's Answer

Perhaps one wonders what strange drive it is that makes a fighter a fighter. What makes him risk his well-being by standing in the center of a boxing ring trading punches with another human being set on inflicting bodily harm on him?

The professional fighter gets his reward in the form of money if nothing else. But what about the amateur boxer on the college level, for example, who cannot take anything for his efforts? What makes him want to fight? What is it like to fight? What must he do to prepare his mind and his body for such punishing competition?

INTERVIEWS

In an attempt to find the answers to these questions, a member of the University of Nevada boxing team for 1957 and 1958 was interviewed. He claims that his feelings are representative of most of the team members and most all of the other amateur fighters that he has had the opportunity to talk with. He is Mike Smith, a wiry 132-pounder who has been working out for the past several weeks to get in shape for the coming season. Smith lettered two years ago, winning one, losing one, and drawing one with a teammate. Last year he was stopped by an attack of appendicitis.

This year he is ready to try it again. Why? Smith claims that it is the spirit of good clean competition. "In the ring it's just you and the other guy. You've got to prove you're the better man or he will."

When asked what it feels like to step into the ring, Smith said: "I get real nervous, butterflies and all, and I guess all fighters are the

same. After the bell rings you trade a few punches, and the nervousness leaves. After that you are O. K."

RUN, RUN, RUN

What do fighters do to get into condition for a season of banging away at each other? Well, they run, and run, and run some more. Run for distance, short wind sprints, and then run some more. This builds the wind, the legs, and the overall endurance. They do sit ups, hundreds of them to condition the mid-section against the punches there. They skip rope for their legs and timing, punch light punching bags for coordination, and heavy bags to develop power in their punches. They spar with each other to develop the skills of the art and to learn to take it as well as dish it out.

Win, lose or draw, the spirit of competition is the main element.

This is a fighter's view of why he likes to fight, how it feels in the ring, and how he must train to get in condition to get into the ring.



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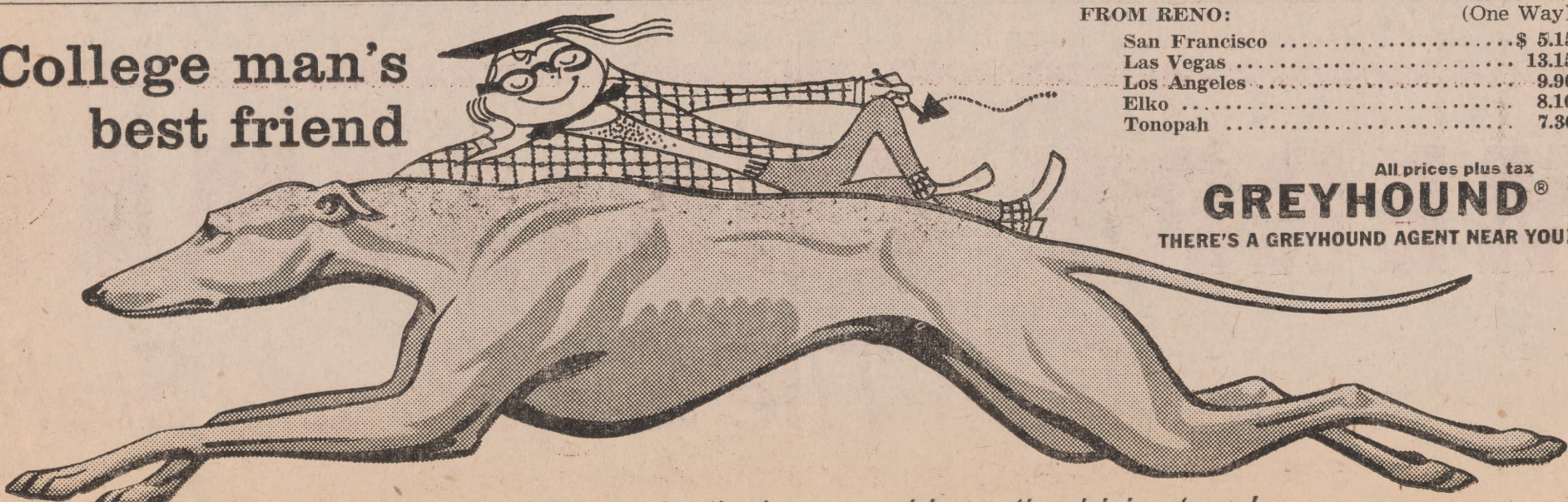
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Cagers Sweep Pair from Eastern Oregon

Walker and Nelson were the standouts in the initial encounter, and Flynn and Legarza drew praise from Coach Jake Lawlor for their work in the second game.

Coach Lawlor will be stressing offensive patterns against a man-to-man defense and individual defense in practice sessions this week.

A 12-man squad departed from Reno Thursday afternoon and will return from Moscow Sunday afternoon.

Former Ambassador Donates Scholarship

Mrs. Perle Mesta, the "hostess with the mostess," ambassador to Luxemburg during the Truman administration, has donated a \$1000 scholarship to the University of Nevada.

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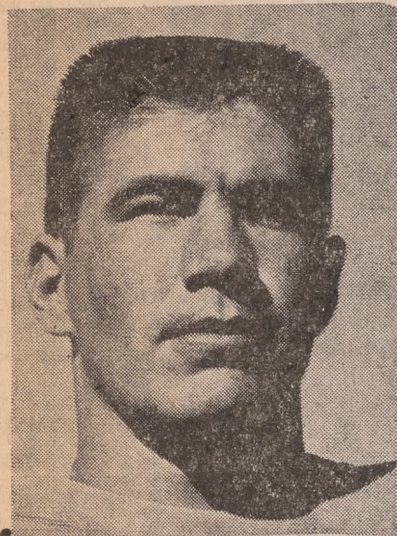




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Whitaker Top Small School Pass Receiver

Tom Whitaker, University of Nevada end, took top position in pass receiving in the NCAA small college division, according to statistics released today.

Whitaker, six-feet and 185 pounds, came to the University of Nevada from Ukiah, Calif., and has shown an outstanding ability to catch aials, as well as having a top record in all around play.

He successfully completed 40 tosses during the nine games of the 1957 season.

Ken Fujii, Wolfpack quarterback, was nosed out in the final game of the season by Jay Roelen of Pepperdine. Fujii completed 102 passes in nine games, Roelen 106 in the same number.

158 ARE ADMITTED TO INFIRMARY SINCE BEGINNING OF THIS SEMESTER

Since the start of this semester, attendants at the University infirmary have cared for 158 students, sometimes as many as 28 at one time.

The illnesses are varied, but flu was the main source of trouble.

The nurses admit that caring for the large number of patients brought to them by the flu epidemic has its special problems. Cots must be provided for all of them. They must be fed. Keeping them down is a hard job in itself. Then too, keeping the boys from visiting their girl friends and girls from visiting their boy friends is sometimes very hard to do.

During the worst part of the flu epidemic as many as 28 sick students had to be provided for at one time by the staff of the infirmary. They put part of their patients in the basement of Lincoln Hall and the rest in the regular quarters at the infirmary. The food was brought from the campus dining hall.

Although bedridden and unable to attend classes the students sometimes ventured into the lobby of Lincoln hall to look at television programs. They also found it to their liking to have visitors. Nurses said that they had to maintain a constant vigil over the students to prevent this and thus stop the spreading of the epidemic.

The staff of the infirmary in-

cludes Dr. C. Robert Locke, Mrs. Mary E. Johnson, Mrs. Ann B. Barnes, Miss Bertha E. Nelson and Miss Elma V. Coleman.

The next meeting for the group will be held in the Mackay School of Mines on January 10, at 8:00 p.m.

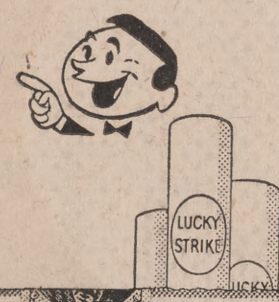

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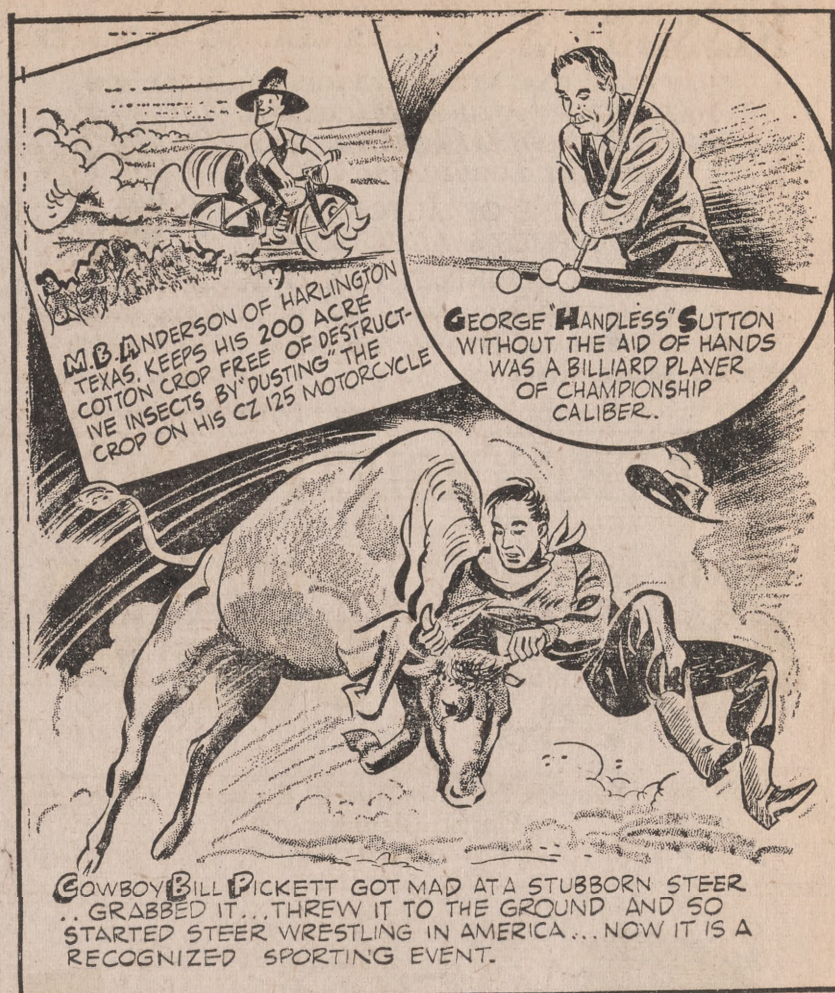
UN Press Club Observes Annual Christmas Party

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


