# Half-Million Cost **New Building Nevada Southern**

The Southern branch of the University of Nevada in Las Vegas will have a new half-million dollar classroom by April, 1959.

The board of regents in a recent meeting in Las Vegas gave the goahead signal to the project of building-another addition to the Las Vegas campus.

The approval for the new school building was given by the Nevada legislature during the 1957 session.

There is now only one classroom building on the new campus, and many of the classes are held in rooms at the various Las Vegas high schools.

Two major problems arise with the construction of the new building, lack of sewer facilities, and the nearness of the McCarran airport to the school site.

The existing sewer line ends about a mile north of the campus and about \$450,000 would be needed to extend it out to the cam-

The present building is serviced by a septic tank which would be inadequate for another building.

The runway for the McCarran asport is being lengthened for jet travel and will terminate within two miles of the campus grounds.

It was stated at the regents meeting, that there would be no danger to the University buildings, but the noise might prove disturb-

## Nevada Missile Also Explodes

In an attempt to enter the "Rocket Age," a group of fraternity pledges launched a missile with much the same results as the recent navy experiments.

The missile, which fizzled and exploded at a height of about 20 feet, was a 14-inch balsa wood one-stage rocket which returned to earth in three pieces.

The launching platform, an upright ash tray, was said to have flown several feet higher than the rocket.

The site of the launching, the front lawn of the Gamma Phi sorority house, was a scene of confusion as the Phi Sigma Kappa Rocket Research team fled for cover behind the sorority hedge and the Gamma Phi house mother scurried for the protection of the front porch.

Experiments have been discontinued until the cause of the explosion can be determined and a new launching site procured.

Victor Williams, director for project, stated simply, "Something must have gone wrong."

# Two Join Nevada **Business Staff**

Hilary H. Sax, C.P.A., has been appointed a lecturer to teach Accounting and Business Law. Sax is author of a textbook, "Shortened CPA Problems," and is under contract to the publishers, Prentice-Hall, to do a second book on industrial accounting.

A graduate member of the Unicersity of Toledo and Harvard Law School, Sax is a member of the American Bar Association. He comes to the campus from the University of Houston, where he taught law and accounting for seven years.

Harvey G. Hallenbeck has been named as assistant director of the Bureau of Business and Economic Research. He has spent the last ten years doing research on the economy and policy planning for the State of Pennsylvania. During this time, he published over twenty studies on state economic planning. Hallenbeck is a graduate of Lehigh and Columbia

### POOLMAN RESIGNS

The resignation of the campus engineer, Robert C. Poolman, was accepted by the board of regents at their February 1 meeting in Las Vegas.

Acting President William R. Wood told the board that Poolman had tentatively accepted appointment as chief engineer of Region Six of the Federal Housing and Home Finance agency.

Poolman will direct engineering activities for the agency's building program in the western states, Alaska and Hawaii.

The resignation, which was accepted with regret by the regents, will become effective February 28.

Poolman was named University engineer in 1955, when the office was created. Prior to that time he was an engineering faculty member since 1946.

### Wolf Pack Moves To Second in FWC

The University of Nevada's Wolf Pack is now up to second place in the Far Western Conference standings after defeating the Cal Aggies in a twin bill last weekend on Nevada's home court.

The final scores for Friday and Saturday night basketball games were—Friday evening, Nevada 66, CCal Aggies 43; Saturday night, Nevada 64, Cal Aggies 37.

Nevada established large leads during the first two periods of both games and coach Jake Lawlor substituted his reserves freely all throughout the second, third, and final periods of play both evenings.

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
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### Charles Smith Addresses UN Press Club, SDX

Charles J. Smith, secretary of the International Newspapers Collectors Club, Phoenix, spoke to journalism students at the Kappa Alpha sorority house on Thursday evening. Attending the meeting were members of the University of Nevada Press club, an dof the Nevada chapter of the journalistic fraternity, Sigma Delta Chi.

Smith talked for nearly an hour, covering the history of news journalism from its beginning nearly three hundred years ago up to the present time.

He exhibited some papers from his collection and displayed some very early papers, foreign papers, and papers bearing headlines which have now become important history. Some of the highlights of his collection are The Observator of London of 1861, The Boston Chronicle of 1768, newspapers bearing the headlines of the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire, and papers from the Stamp Act days with stamps printed on them.

A. L. Higginbotham, professor of journalism at the University of Nevada, and Neal Van Sooy, editor of the Nevada Appeal in Carson City are the only two Nevada members of the International Newspapers Collectors club.

# Polio Shots Are Still Available For Dollar Each

Polio shots are still available to students for one dollar each.

The shots are given at the Medical Arts laboratory located at 505 South Arlington avenue. Cards identifying university students as such must be picked up at the campus infirmary first, however.

The full polio treatment includes three shots costing one dollar each. The second shot is given one month after the first, and the final shot seven months after the second. A booster shot is now being given at yearly intervals.

Since nurses employed by the state cannot give these polio shots, the infirmary is unable to offer the service. The nurses on campus are state-employed.

A large number of students have picked up their cards but relatively few have received the shots so far.

Not only students, but also their dependents may receive these shots.

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
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


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# Kellogg's Krispies

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

# Informal sorority rushing begins New Building To Bear Name Of Doctor Church

The new fine arts building soon to be constructed on the University campus will be named for Dr. J. E. Church, professor emeritus of classics at the University. This action was taken at the board of regents meeting held in Las Vegas on February 1.

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
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
