Williams' Play 'Is Terrific'

First nighters were treated to a truly great theatrical production last night in the Education auditorium. Tennessee Williams' masterful "memory play," "The Glass Menagerie," was magnificently presented to campus drama lovers by an engrossingly entertaining cast of polished performers under the inspired direction of Prof. Charles Metten. The classic will continue through Saturday evening.

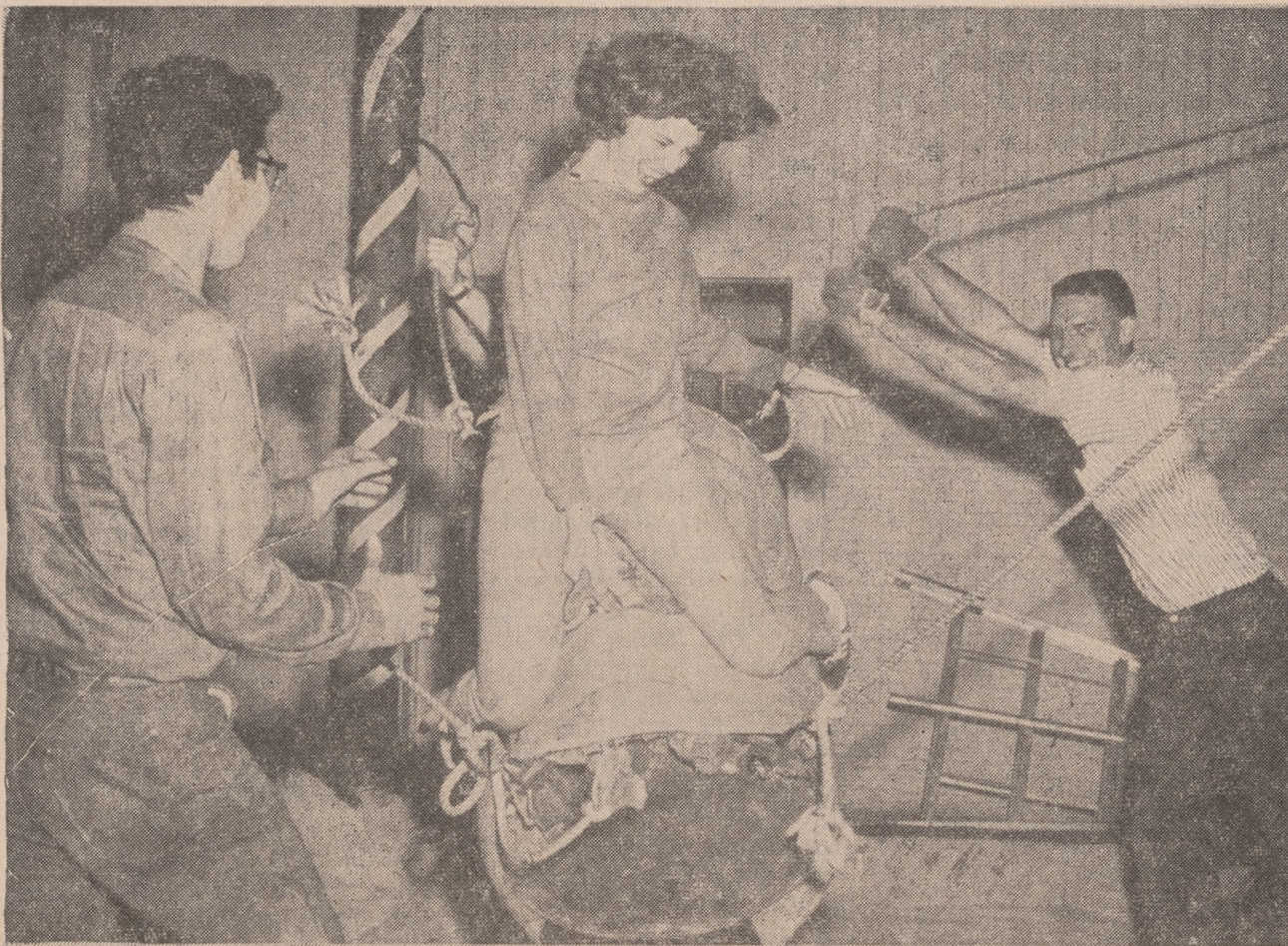
The awed audience saw Kathleen O'Leary as Amanda Wingfield, the aging, Southern belle mother who lives in a gay, mint-juleped past. She is desperately worried that her shy daughter will never marry and will be left alone in her later years as she herself was deserted by her travel-hungry husband 16 years before. Miss O'Leary's handling of her scene-dominating, Southern gentry inflected dialogue is exceptionally powerful.

Delicate Sensitivity

The daughter, Laura, is portrayed by Janice Aalbu with such delicate sensitivity that her fragile glass-transparent image stands sweetly silent in the foreground throughout the pleasing performance. Miss Aalbu's poignant portrayal of the introverted, crippled collector of glass animals is delightfully moving and tender.

Jerry Small, playing the bread-winning son with the poet's heart, Tom Wingfield, is surprising in his switch or speaking voice and manner from "present-son" narrator to "past-son" narrator in a dramatic flexibility actually found in only the experienced trouper. He plays the travel-worn sailor and rebellious son with equal brilliance at the

Behind the Scenes

THE NEVADA STATE legislature, that oft-bumbling, time wasting, money splurging lawmaking body referred to by one Nevada newspaper of general excellence as the "Carson City Zoo," must be handed a commendation for its foresight, and, accordingly, its generosity toward the development of the University of Nevada. And, an equal commendation of worth should be extended to the University's First Legislative Diplomat—a man who, since he has been on this campus, has used progress as his byword—Dr. Charles J. Armstrong, the University president.

THE LEGISLATURE, meeting annually for the first time this year, appropriated \$32 million for the state's needs. Of this amount, eight million dollars was granted to the University for further progress in its large building program for initial development of the at-times-forgotten Las Vegas campus, and for an increase in staff operation through raises in salary and additions to the teaching staff.

THE UNIVERSITY'S successful and well-founded bid for legislative appropriations was met with bureaucratic bickering, as was expected, but through the clouds of political war-waging broke a last minute ray of intelligent legislative agreement when Swackhamer and Sawyer forces settled on an all-time high for appropriations to this state's only institution of higher academic merit. During the extended, generally time-wasting session, Governor Sawyer fought against spending 2.8 million for a new engineering building, the cream of the sought-after appropriations, and then, just before the 55-day session broke up, the Governor agreed with legislative forces led by William Swackhamer (D-Lander), who were fighting for maximum appropriations for the University.

BEHIND THE SCENES, but, with a strong and winning influence was the University president, clearly a man who is out 100 percent to get things done around here.

Slanted? Biased?

IN THIS EDITION the first installment of the proposed revision to the ASUN Constitution is being presented to Sagebrush readers so they will be able to vote intelligently on its acceptance or rejection when the question is placed on the ballot during the ASUN election next month. The remainder of the revision will be run in a later edition, prior to the election.

SOME NEWSPAPER readers constantly claim that news copy is slanted or biased. These mislead skeptics will no doubt cast their critical eye on the constitutional revision copy. Amongst this group of critics are many student government personalities.

IF THESE CRITICS sound their usual unfounded opinion and claim the constitutional revision is slanted or biased they will have to blame themselves. They wrote it.

Judicial Wisdom?

DOWN YONDER at San Francisco City College the always interesting battle between nature and human nature has presented a problem which has placed that institution's name on the nation's front pages.

IT SEEMS that a co-ed with a somewhat distracting 41-26-37 figure and a choice for tight clothing is causing an uproar amongst the associated students on the San Francisco campus.

AT NEVADA, if such a problem arose, it would be interesting to watch the student court justices hand down their wisdom in this area of judgment.

Other Schools

Special to The Sagebrush—Voluntary ROTC has been adopted by the regents of the University of Wisconsin, though with a two-year long string attached.

The Wisconsin board of regents decided to end compulsory military training by a nine to one vote on February 20, bringing success to a ten year movement of both faculty members and students toward this goal.

But the voluntary program is conditional. If the number of students enrolled in upper division ROTC two years from now has dropped below 75 per cent of the number enrolled in the program in the fall of 1959, military training will automatically become compulsory again.

The two-year trial period will also include a plan for improving the quality of the military program. The idea is to offer more courses of an advanced, technical nature during summer camps. During the regular college year, the students will have more time in their programs for non-military courses.

The University of Oklahoma—where a campus debate between advocates of the voluntary system and an officer of the Oklahoma reserve drew headlines in local papers, and the University of California at Los Angeles—where a petition against compulsory ROTC had 2,300 signatures in mid-February, are the latest scenes of action in the growing move to make ROTC voluntary on college campuses.

Brigadier General Clyde Watts denounced advocates of voluntary ROTC as "guileless cowards and panty waists" in a debate at Oklahoma recently.

The case for voluntary ROTC was presented by George Hazelrigg, past student body president, who pointed out that the student and faculty senates at Oklahoma had passed a resolution to make ROTC participation on the campus voluntary, and that the resolution had been sent to the board of regents of the university.

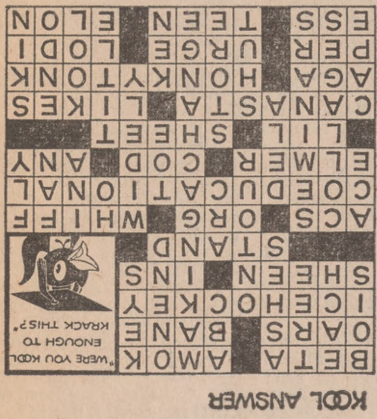

History of Nevada Written by Grad

A revised Political History of Nevada has been written by a graduate of the University of Nevada, Arthur J. Palmer, Jr., assistant to the legislative counsel.

Dr. Austin E. Hutcheson, professor of history aided in research of historical data.

Copies of the book were provided gratis by the legislature to all schools of the state through the cooperation of John Koontz, secretary of state. They have been included as text books in history and constitution.

A notable feature in the new issue are the changes in territorial maps, state boundaries and counties since the early years.

Performances of "Trouble in Tahiti," by Leonard Bernstein and "Archie and Mehitabel," by George Kleinsinger are scheduled for May 13 and 14 in the Education auditorium.

The Opera Workshop performances will be sponsored by the

ASUN as have the spring musicals in the past.

Productions will be under the direction of Professor Ronald R. Williams of the department of music. Williams has written a number of musical comedies, given college productions, and was the director of the Opera Workshop of the College of Emporia, Kansas, which premiered a number of one-act operas during his stay there.

Auditions for roles in these productions will be held Friday afternoon, March 25, in the old gym room 1, between 2 o'clock and 5 o'clock. Any interested parties that cannot attend at those hours should meet Williams in his studio by appointment by calling extension 237. Singers, dancers, stage crew, a business manager, publicity manager, and a narrator are needed.

"Archie and Mehitabel" is based on the Don Mraquis stories, and was produced on Broadway three years ago, starring Carol Channing, Eddie Bracken and David Wayne. Leonard Bernstein's compositions, such as "West Side Story" and "On the Town" and "Wonderful Town" are well-known and in an up-to-date musical idiom.

Proposed ASUN Constitutional Revisions

PREAMBLE
We, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada, in order to provide an organization for the promotion and control of all matters of general student concern, and to further the welfare of this university, do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution and by-laws.

ARTICLE I
Executive
Section 1. President

A. Qualifications:
1. Shall be a member of the ASUN.
2. Shall have a minimum number of hours required for upper-division junior standing by the college in which he is registered at the time he is elected to office.
3. Shall have been a member of the ASUN for four semesters in all, two of which shall have been immediately preceding the election.
4. Shall have an overall grade point average of not lower than 2.2 as shall all other ASUN officers (elected and appointed), editors, business managers, and all committee chairmen.
B. Powers and Duties
1. The president shall be the chief executive officer and official representative of the association and shall preside at all meetings of the association and of the Senate.
2. He shall be chairman of the Executive Council, and ex-officio member of all other ASUN committees.
3. Unless otherwise provided in the ASUN Constitution he shall have the power to appoint all ASUN Committee Chairmen, subject to approval by

the Executive Council and the ASUN Senate.
4. He shall appoint the students to serve on the Student-Faculty committees.
5. He shall maintain office hours.
6. It shall be his duty to see that By-Laws are carried out to the fullest extent.
7. Veto: The president shall have the right to veto any act passed by the Senate.
8. Vote: The president shall have the right to vote in the Senate only in case of a tie.
C. Salary
The president shall receive a salary, the amount of which shall be determined by the Finance Control Board at its first regular meeting of each university year.
D. Term of Office
The tenure of office for the ASUN President shall be from May 15 to May 15.

Section 2. First Vice-President

A. Qualifications: Shall be the same as for the ASUN President.
B. Powers and Duties
1. Shall be a voting member of the Executive Council.
2. Shall be the Chairman of the Finance Control Board and the Publications Board.
3. Shall, with the co-operation of the outgoing ASUN officers, and committee chairman, supervise and draw up an overall budget of all ASUN financially sponsored activities to occur during the ensuing school year after he is elected to office, said budget to be submitted to the ASUN President and with his approval, he shall submit it to the Finance Control Board and Senate for final approval.
4. Shall preside at all ASUN functions in the absence of the ASUN President.
C. Salary
The first Vice-President shall receive a salary, the amount of which shall be determined by the Finance Control Board at its first regular meeting of each university year.
D. Term of Office
The term of office shall be the same as for the ASUN President.
Section 3. Second Vice-President
A. Qualifications: Shall be the same as for the ASUN President.
B. Powers and Duties
1. Shall be a voting member of the Executive Council.
2. Shall be responsible for schedul-

ing and co-ordinating all ASUN social functions, rallies and assemblies.
3. Shall supervise printing of the ASUN Social Calendar.
4. Shall preside over all ASUN functions in the absence of the ASUN President and the first Vice-President.
5. Shall be responsible for recommending to the Executive Committee that constitutions of prospective organizations be considered.
C. Salary
The second Vice-President shall receive a salary, the amount of which shall be determined by the Finance Control Board at its first regular meeting of each university year.
D. Term of Office
Shall be the same as for the ASUN President.

Section 4. Secretary

A. Appointment:
One woman of the Associated Women Students (AWS) at large, shall be of upperclass standing at the beginning of the fall semester, shall be appointed secretary upon the nomination of the ASUN President and approval of the Executive Council.
B. Duties
It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Senate, Publications Board, Finance Control Board, and the Executive Council.
C. Salary
The secretary shall receive a salary to be determined by the Finance Control Board at its first regular meeting of each university year.
D. Term of Office:
The term of office for the ASUN secretary shall be the same as the ASUN President.
Section 5. Graduate Manager
A. The Graduate Manager of the ASUN shall be appointed by the Finance Control Board subject to the approval of the President of the University of Nevada, or the Board of Regents, and the ASUN Senate and shall be signed to a contract, the term to be decided upon by the Finance Control Board.
B. Duties:
1. To serve as a non-voting member of the Finance Control Board and the Publications Board.
2. To supervise the receipts and expenditure of all ASUN moneys, unless otherwise specified in this constitution, and to be financially responsible to the Finance Control Board for the same.
3. To manage the ASUN Bookstore.

4. To have such other specific duties as the Finance Control Board may designate, or as designated in the ASUN Constitution or By-Laws, and in the conduct of such duties to be responsible to the Finance Control Board.
C. Salary
The Graduate Manager shall receive a salary, the amount to be determined by the Finance Control Board.

Section 5. Class Officers

A. Qualifications
1. Class Presidents, at the time they shall assume office shall be any regularly enrolled student at the University and have the minimum number of hours required by the college in which they are registered for regular standing in the class to whose presidency they are elected.
2. A class president shall be elected by each class at the regular ASUN elections, with the exception of the Freshmen Class President, who shall be elected during the Fall semester of the new school year.
3. With the exception of the Freshman Class President, all class presidents shall have an overall grade point average of not lower than 2.2.
4. All candidates for Freshman Class President have an overall High School average not less than 2.2 as determined by the University registrar.
B. Duties
1. The class presidents shall have the power to appoint committees and name assistants.
2. The class president shall be the official class representative and conduct all class business, with the exception of the finances which he will supervise in conjunction with the Graduate Manager.
3. It shall be the duty of the Freshman Class President, all class presidents shall have an overall grade point average of not lower than 2.2.
4. All candidates for Freshman Class President have an overall High School average not less than 2.2 as determined by the University registrar.
B. Duties
1. The class presidents shall have the power to appoint committees and name assistants.
2. The class president shall be the official class representative and conduct all class business, with the exception of the finances which he will supervise in conjunction with the Graduate Manager.
3. It shall be the duty of the Freshman Class President to assume chair-

manship of the High School President's Day Committee.
4. It shall be the duty of the Sophomore and Freshman Class Presidents to jointly plan the Frosh-Soph Field Day, the date of which shall be set by the Senate.
5. It shall be the duty of the Junior Class President to act as Chairman of the Junior Prom.
6. It shall be the duty of the Senior Class President to be in charge of commencement activities and act as Chairman of the Senior Ball.
7. Class President shall be ex-officio members of the ASUN Senate.
C. Term of Office
The term of office for the Sophomore, Junior, and Senior Class Presidents shall be from September 1 until June 5 of the ensuing school year after they are elected and the Freshman Class President shall serve from his election in the Fall until the end of the ensuing Spring Semester.

ARTICLE II
Senate
Section 1. Membership and Tenure of Office

A. The Senate shall be composed of one representative from each recognized social fraternity and sorority on the campus, it being understood that such recognition shall be granted by the President of the University; one unaffiliated representative from each of the dormitories; each college shall have at least one representative elected by the students within the college, the college representation to be based on a plurality basis of 200 students, the first representative from the colleges are to be unaffiliated, the other representatives can be either affiliated or unaffiliated, the ASUN President, the AWS President, the Four Senators-at-Large, the Student Union Board.
B. College Senators shall be elected at the ASUN election; they be elected for one year; any person who desires to run, submit his name to the ASUN President's office two weeks prior to the primary elections.
C. Four Senators-at-Large shall be elected for a two-year term, the terms alternating so that two senators, one man and one woman, shall be elected yearly. All Senators-at-Large shall serve on the Publications Board and on the Finance Control Board.
D. All Senators must have an overall grade point average of 2.2.
Section 2. Business Procedure
A. Regular meetings of the Senate shall be held on the first and third

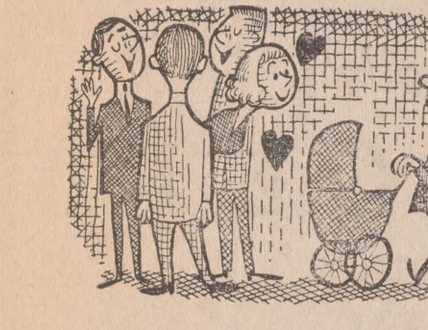

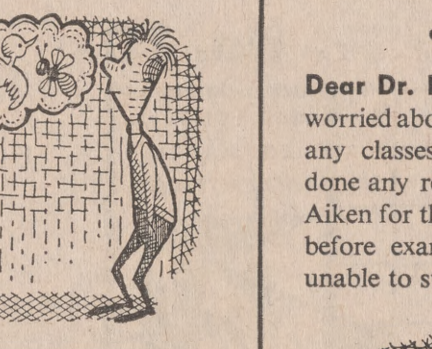

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Wednesdays of each month. Special meetings may be called by the ASUN President.

A. Regular meetings of the Senate shall be held on the first and third Wednesdays of each month. Special meetings may be called by the ASUN President.

B. Three-fourths of the total membership shall constitute a quorum.

C. Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable.

D. Any member in good standing in the ASUN has the right to attend Senate meetings.

Section 3. Powers and Duties

A. The Senate must approve by a two-thirds majority vote all ASUN Committee Chairman and Faculty Advisors.

B. The Senate has the power to grant or refuse recognition to all student organizations and to approve their By-Laws with the consent and approval of the President of the University.

C. The Senate may suspend or revoke any or all of the ASUN privileges of any member of the association at any time that such action is deemed advisable.

D. The Senate shall supervise and fix the time of all ASUN elections.

E. The Senate shall have the power to override the President's veto by a three-fourths vote or his veto may be overridden by a majority vote of the student body of the ASUN providing that 30 per cent of the student body votes in the election.

F. The Senate shall have the power to review any action of the Finance Control Board, the Publications Board, the Graduate Manager, and the books of any organization which uses ASUN money or makes money for the ASUN.

G. The Senate shall appoint upon recommendation by the Executive Council or of the committees concerned the following committee members-at-large: 1) Two members of the faculty to serve as advisors to the Finance Control Board. 2) One member of the faculty to serve as advisor to the Publications Board.

H. If a Senate vacancy exists within a college the college shall be responsible to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Initiative

A. In case the Senate overrides the President's veto, and the latter deems it necessary to take the issue before the students, and after ten per cent (10%) of the members of the ASUN have signed this petition, the question shall be subject to the vote of the student body. A majority of those voting shall constitute a reversal of the Senate's action.

Section 5. Impeachment

A. The Senate is required to institute impeachment proceedings against any elected officer of the ASUN if and only if a petition is presented to them signed by twenty-five (25%) of the student body, naming the officer to be impeached and enumerating the charges against him.

B. A three-fourths vote of the total membership of the Senate will be required to convict the officer being impeached.

C. The Senior men's Senator-at-Large shall preside over all impeachment proceedings and the Senior Woman's Senator-at-Large shall act as recorder. In the event one of the Senators-at-Large is being impeached the ASUN President shall preside and the ASUN Secretary shall act as recorder.

D. The officer being impeached has the right to choose any member of the student body or faculty member to defend him.

ARTICLE III Committees

Section 1. Executive Council

A. The Executive Council of the ASUN shall be composed of the ASUN President, the first and second Vice-Presidents, the AWS President and one other member to be chosen by the Senate; that person to be a Senator.

B. Powers and Duties

1. The Executive power of the ASUN shall be vested in the Executive Council.

2. The Executive Council shall determine the agenda for each Senate meeting.

3. In the event a vacancy occurs in any elective office of the ASUN the Executive Council will submit two names to the Senate for approval. In the event neither are approved by a two-thirds vote new recommendations must be made, excluding the names already considered.

4. The Executive Council shall have power to call special assemblies of the association whenever deemed advisable.

5. The Council shall approve the official granting of awards and insignia.

6. The Council shall approve the by-laws of all organizations governed in part or in whole by the ASUN Constitution prior to submission to the ASUN Senate.

7. The Council shall interpret the ASUN Constitution and By-Laws whenever the meaning and intent of passages is questionable.

8. The Council in conjunction with the Senate shall examine all proposed amendments to the ASUN Constitution and By-Laws before they are submitted to the Student Body and to order such changes in the wording without nullifying the intention of the amendment as may be necessary to avoid ambiguity.

9. The Council shall approve the selection by the ASUN President, prior to submission to the ASUN Senate, of all ASUN committee chairmen and faculty members unless otherwise provided for in the Constitution.

10. The Council shall, in case two (2) candidates do not file for an ASUN elective office, nominate one (1) or two (2) candidates as necessary.

C. Three (3) members shall constitute a quorum on the Executive Council.

Section 2. Finance Control Board

A. Membership
The Finance Control Board shall consist of the following: ASUN First Vice-President as chairman and who shall vote only in case of a tie; four Senators-at-Large; and the ASUN President. Non-voting members of the Board shall be the Graduate Manager, two faculty advisors, and the ASUN Secretary.

B. Duties

1. To have in its charge and to control the administration of all ASUN finances, with the exception of those allotted to athletics.

2. To be custodian of the finances of the ASUN Bookstore.

3. To determine what organizations shall be allowed or denied the privilege of the central treasury and to supervise the acquisition and disbursement by such organizations of all funds except initiation fees and membership dues.

4. To approve the appointment of the Graduate Manager with the approval of the President of the University and Board of Regents, and to fix said manager's salary and length of contract.

5. To fix the salary of ASUN officers where such salaries are specified in the ASUN Constitution and By-Laws; all ASUN officers' salaries must be presented to the Senate for final approval.

6. To approve the ASUN First Vice-President's budget and the budgets of all ASUN organizations which earn or use ASUN money such budgets to be submitted to the committee not later than the first four weeks of each semester.

7. To suspend the activities and to withdraw financial support from any student organization when its financial condition makes such action necessary.

8. To authorize soliciting of advertisements for any purpose whatsoever, including the three (3) official publications, by the person acting for, or using then name of any ASUN organization.

9. To authorize the checking of receipts at any ASUN function.

C. Any unpaid bills of any ASUN organization which are found to be authentic by the Finance Control Board may be paid by the committee from the surplus in the Central Treasury, credited to the organization concerned.

D. The Central Treasury shall be the depository for all ASUN organizations, deriving funds from the Central Treasury including dues and special assessments, and the financial administration of such organizations shall be governed by the Finance Control Board. The income accruing to any function underwritten by the ASUN shall revert to the ASUN Central Treasury unless an exception is made by the Finance Control Board.

E. Three voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

F. Specific rules governing the financial administration of all organizations in the Central Treasury shall be incorporated in the By-Laws of the Finance Control Board and shall be available for examination upon request by any member of the ASUN.

G. The net profits of the ASUN Bookstore, after all borrowed money has been repaid, shall be placed in the ASUN Central Treasury subject to the approval of the Finance Control Board.

Section 3. Publications Board

A. Membership

The Publication Board shall consist of the following members: The ASUN first Vice-President as chairman, who will vote only in case of a tie; the editor and business manager of the Sagebrush and of the Artemisia; the ASUN President; and the four Senators-at-Large. Non-voting members of the Board shall be the faculty advisor, the Graduate Manager and the ASUN Secretary.

B. Publications Selections: The Publications Board shall meet annually during the week of April 15 to elect by a majority vote the editors and business managers of the official publications upon recommendation of the incumbent editors and business managers of the respective publications, all of whom shall serve during the ensuing year.

C. Removal From Office: The editor or business manager of either publication may be removed from office in the case of incompetence. Such removal shall receive a two-thirds vote of the Publications Board, all members being present. The defendant or defendants shall have the right of a fair trial by the Board, but shall not be allowed to vote, and upon request shall have the right to appeal to the Senate for a review and final decision concerning the case.

D. In the event of vacancies of the Editors or Business Managers of the official publications such vacancies shall be filled by the Publications Board.

E. Policy: The Publications Board shall maintain strict supervisory control over all ASUN publications. Questions concerning the policy or efficiency of editorial departments or business departments must be referred to the Board for action.

F. Meetings: Regular meetings shall be held each month of the university year; special meetings may be called by the chairman or the ASUN President. Five members present shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IV Elections

Section 1. General Elections

A. Credit hours and grade point averages for the purpose of establishing eligibility to hold office shall be certified by the Registrar and approved by the Executive Council.

B. Should a vacancy occur in any

elective office with the exception of class officers, the Senate shall appoint a person to fill the vacancy in the manner prescribed in Article III, Section 1, Sub-section B, Item 3. This appointment will be valid until the expiration of the term of the former office holder unless a new election is called.

C. Should a vacancy occur in any class office all nominations will be received by the ASUN President within one week of the announcement of such vacancy. It shall then be the duty of the ASUN President to carry out the election.

Section 2. Rules for Election

A. The Senate shall fix the time and place and supervise all ASUN elections with the exception of the Freshman Class President election, which will be held during the fifth week of the fall semester, and under the supervision of the Senate.

B. All elections shall be governed by rules provided in the By-Laws.

Section 3. Nominations

A. Nominations for the ASUN President, the first and second Vice-Presidents, the Senators-at-Large, and Class President, excepting the Freshman Class President, shall be submitted to the ASUN President one week before the Nomination Assembly, which shall be called annually to present candidates prior to the primary election. Nominations for Freshman Class President must be presented to the ASUN President two weeks prior to the election the fall Semester, in writing.

ARTICLE V ASUN Intercollegiate Activities

Section 1. Athletics

A. Major Sports: Football, basketball, boxing, skiing, track, tennis, baseball and golf are the recognized major sports for which major varsity awards may be granted, as provided for in the By-Laws.

B. Minor Sports: Minor sports are those sports which are recognized by the ASUN and the Department of Athletics, and in which competition is had with other colleges or universities. Awards to be given for participation as outlined in the By-Laws.

C. Women's Athletics: Women's athletics shall be under the supervision of the Women's Recreation Association and shall be governed by its by-laws.

Section 2. Forensics and Band

A. A student is eligible for awards, as outlined in the By-Laws, for participation in intercollegiate forensics.

B. Awards will be given for participation in the Band as outlined in the By-Laws.

ARTICLE VI Method of Amendment

Section 1. Proposal

A. An amendment must be placed on the ballot if: 1. proposed by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, or 2. proposed by a petition signed by twenty-five per cent (25%) of the ASUN student body members.

Section 2. Notification

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A. A copy of the amendment must be posted at least ten days on the official bulletin board prior to the time of voting.

B. A copy of the amendment must be published at least once in the U. of N. Sagebrush prior to the time of voting.

Section 3. Voting

A. The ASUN constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote with at

least 30 per cent (30%) of the ASUN voting.

B. Voting shall be by secret ballot, at a time and place designated by the Senate.

Section 4. Amending the By-Laws
A. The By-Laws of the ASUN may be amended by a three-fourths majority vote of the ASUN Senate at any regular meeting as heretofore provided in this constitution.

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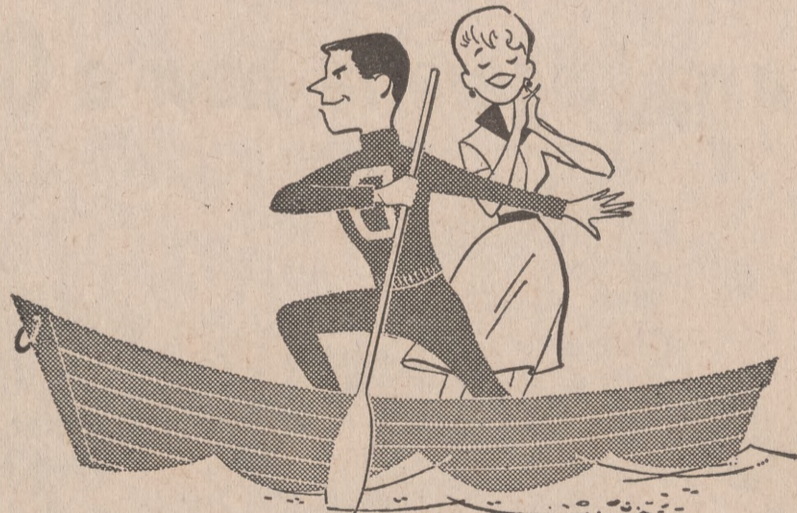
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Pack Cindermen Trek to Chico For 3-Way Meet

Coach Dick Dankworth's University of Nevada track team travels to Chico Saturday for a three-way with defending FWC track champions Humboldt State and host Chico State.

The Nevada cindermen, fresh from a convincing 75-51 win over San Francisco State last week, will face stiff competition from outstanding competitors such as the Lumberjacks "Fabulous Four."

Humboldt State's top four tracksters are Ro'er Biffle, who has cleared 14 feet in the pole vault; Keith Weidkamp, who has run the 440 in 49.5; 200-foot javelin tosser Vester Flanigan, and Larry Krupa, high scoring center on the Lumberjacks' basketball team, who has soared 6-4 in the high jump.

Chico State will also provide a tough man in the pole vault, Ken Williams, who has gone 13-6.

Bob Challenger smashed a Nevada record which had stood for 30 years, by blazing over the low hurdles in 23.6 seconds, for the most outstanding mark of Nevada's victory.

The Wolf Pack finished one-two-three in the 220-yard dash and the discus and had two double winners—Dick Strunk in the 100 and 220 with times 9.9 and 21.7, respectively, and Rod Cook in the shot putt of 48-0 and 138-10 in the javelin.

Other winners were freshmen oJe Winchell who ran a 50.8 440; Dave Longacre's 13-6 topped the pole vaulters; Mike Lommori in the discus with a 138-10 toss, and lithe Bob Ritche's good jump of 22-4 copped the broad jump.

Promising freshmen Doug Keron placed second in both the mile and the two-mile distance runs; Joe Winchell, who besides winning the 440, placed second in the 220, and Hawthorne's Don Hunt, who got a second in the high hurdles.

Nevada will have its first home meet next Saturday, in a three-way meet against Idaho State and Oregon Tech, at Mackay Stadium.

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Five Wolf Pack Boxers Enter Pacific Coast Tournament

At least five University of Nevada boxers entered the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate championships which started last night in Sacramento and continue through Saturday to the finals.

NCAA champ Joe Bliss (132-lb.), Mills Lane (147-lb.), Lonnie Tolano (156-lb.), Rueben Harney (178-lb.) and John Genasci, heavyweight, were the Wolf Pack entries in the three-day PCI ring tournament.

One more Nevada boxer, featherweight Steve Parker, was suffering from a bruised nose early in the week and coach Jimmie Olivias did not know whether Parker would participate in the tournament or not.

The Nevada team is fresh from its best team effort of the season with a 5½ to 2½ team victory in the dual match against Washington State.

The Wolf Pack had five winners in their last home bout of the year, managed a draw in one fight and dropped two bouts to the Cougars. Bliss, the only senior on the squad, took an impressive TKO victory over scrappy Charles Johnson in his last home bout as a collegian.

Bliss cornered the pint-sized Johnson against the ropes in the third round and was unleashing his usual savage attack of body punches when referee Sammy Macias, a former Wolf Pack fighter, stopped the fight midway through the third round.

Bliss weakened Johnson in the first two rounds with a barrage of rights and his best weapon—the left—to the midsection.

Other Nevada winners were Lane, in the welterweight match, Tolano in the 156-pound go, Harney in the leightheavy weight division, and Genasci in the heavyweight fight.

Gerry Hook, a transfer from Coalinga Junior College, fought to a draw in a close fight with Washington State's John Finnala in the 139-pound match.

Lane, who had missed the last two fights with injuries or illness, ran into the same style fighter as he is but battled his way to a win by a decision over the Cougar's Larry Largent.

Both fighters fought from a protective shell and took turns trading body attacks. Almost the entire bout was fought at close range with Lane getting the nod for some hard uppercuts and right crosses to Largent's head.

Harney was almost too exhausted to finish the third round but came out the winner by a decision over Don Borozan of Washington State in the 178-pound go.

Both fighters were tossing the leather as if their lives depended on the outcome of the fight and

by the end of the bout both were glad it was over.

Harney, a soph from Owyhee, took a lot of punches but wasn't hurt, as his loose-swinging style made him roll with the punch. It was a well-deserved frist triumph in the ring career of the stout-hearted, determined Harney.

Genasci turned in his best effort of the season to decision burly Cougar Dan Verhey in the heavyweight match. Genasci stayed away from the 230-pound All-Pacific Coast football tackle and tossed straight rights and jabs to the face to pick up points.

Parker ran into the best collebe-125-pounder in the country in the person of slender Bobby Cornwell and Cornwell smashed his way to a unanimous decision.

Dick Haymond started out fine but ran into a crashing right to the jaw and lost a KO to Washington State's Bob Davido in the 165-pound battle.

Haymond rushed into the ring throwing knockout-caliber rights in the first round and was ahead on points until he was floored in the second round after bouncing off the ropes.

Tolano suffered a bad first round but came back in the second and third rounds to nail down a unanimous decision over Larry Warner in the 156-pound bout.

Tolano tossed some damaging straight rights and lefts and was after a knockout victory to go on to out-gun the stocky Cougar.

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Ski Team Bound for NCAA Finals; Take First in Far Western Meet

University of Nevada Skier's hopes in the upcoming NCAA national championship at Bozeman, Mont., were brightened considerably last weekend by taking the Far Western Invitational Intercollegiate tournament at Squaw Valley, Calif.

Nevadans Jon Madsen and Doug Salter placed one-two in the final event of jumping to clinch the victory for the Wolf Pack. Nevada had an eleven-point lead going into the final day of the three-day meet, and the high placing in the jumping assured the Blue and White of first place in the team standings.

Final standings figure-wise showed the Pack with 373.29 points for first place; University of California Bears were second with 358.83; Sierra College Wolverines of Auburn were third, 337.15, and Chico State took fourth with a 335.49 total. Other finishers in order of standing were, San Jose State, Arizona State, and American River College of Sacramento.

Outstanding all-around contestant and winner of the "Skimeister" trophy was Doug Salter of Nevada. Salter was second in jumping,

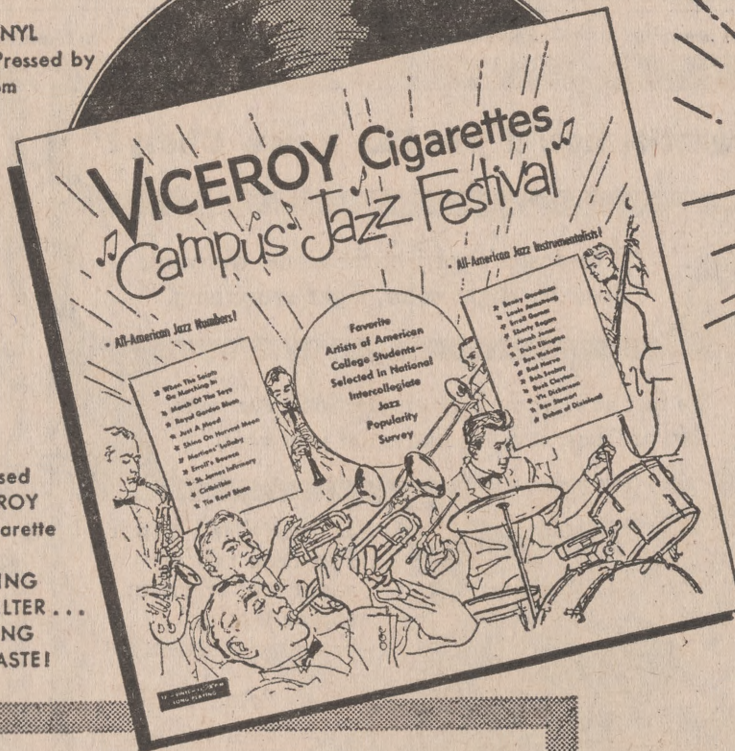

Senator Heward proclaimed at a Senate meeting this morning in the Grotto Bar, "An ASUN officer of the ASUN, that's what it is."

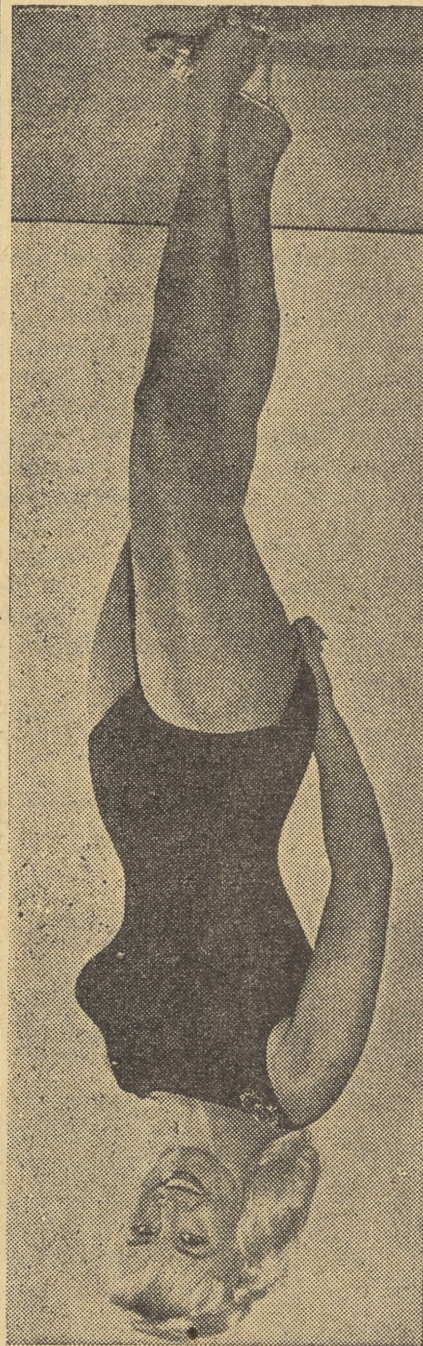
