Echerverria Names Chairmen

· Student Union Change Asked

A totally new Student Union constitution will be presented to the students for approval or rejection at a special election Wednesday, May 18. The constitution is completely new, not a revision of the present document.

Several changes in the new constitution call for a reorganized executive group, set up classes of membership, and provide for the eventual selection of a Union di-

Acceptance of the proposed constitution by a simple majority of the students voting is all that will be needed to put it into effect, according to Roger Christensen, president of the student union board. He said that a two-thirds majority would not be necessary because a completely new constitution, not a revision or an amendment, will be presented to the student union membership.

The new executive body of the group is slated to be a seven-man board of directors. These directors may be from any school or college on campus. Under the present organization set up, members of the Student Union board are specifically drawn from each school and col-

There will also be an activities council, composed of the chairmen of the standing committees, in addition to the board of directors.

The purpose of the board of directors, Christensen told the Sagebrush, would be to set down basic policy matters, while most of the day-to-day functions of the union would be under the direction of the activities council.

Three classes of membership will be set up under the new constitution. They will be: student membership, consisting of all Nevada students paying the student union fee; honorary membership, to be awarded to members of the student union "who served the union with outstanding distinction"; and life membership, to be presented to benefactors of the student union.

Provision has been made for the eventual selection of a student union director, to be responsible for the conduct of all business concerning the student union.

The new constitution would allow the board of directors to make increases in the union fee with the approval of the board of regents.

"On some issues this year the Sagebrush has not presented all the facts," he said. "I'm tired of this one-sided affair." When asked what specific issue the Sagebrush had held back "all the facts," Echeverria said, "Offhand, I couldn't say."

Whose Editorial?

"This will not be my own personal editorial," Echeverria said in reference to the student news-letter. The upperclass committee chairmen will serve as co-editors. "I may contribute, but not in every issue," Echeverria said.

The news-letter will not carry general campus news, but strictly student government coverage, he

I do not feel that there is need for two full size newspapers on campus, but I feel that a news-letter will carry the "straight dope on student government," he said.

BUT, THE STUDENTS will hardly be gullible enough to accept the white-washed version of student government which will be handed to them in a student government house organ. Every member of student government this year will admit that it has made mistakes, and plenty of them. After all, the student governors are simply human beings, and whether we like it or not, human beings make plenty of mistakes. One aspect of Sagebrush responsibility to the student-body is to report these mistakes. Only then are the students able to know if their government is inadequate.

IT IS DOUBTFUL that Echeverria's house organ will provide the students with honest coverage of the inadequacies of student government. It will probably paint a pretty picture of the ASUN president and ASUN senate's activities. And the responsibility will remain for the Sagebrush to report, interpret and give opinions on the ups and downs of student government.

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



Gumball Machine Gone, Says Senator


Jim Megquire, who sells gum balls when he is not busy attending to the students' business as a senator-at-large, is facing a professional dilemma.



Proposed New Constitution of the **Jot Travis Memorial Student Union**

Election May 18 at Student Union Building

ARTICLE I Name

The name of this organization shall be THE JOT TRAVIS MEM-ORIAL STUDENT UNION.

ARTICLE II Purpose

The object, business, and pursuit of the said organization is to provide a suitable center for student services and programs, a headquarters for their administrative work, also an informal meeting place of faculty, alumni, students, and friends of the University of Nevada, all to the end of strengthening the ties of friendship and supplementing college education by developing high ideals, college spirit, and good citizenship.

ARTICLE III Membership

SECTION I: Classes of Membership. There shall be three classes of membership in the Student Union: Student members, honorary members, and life members. All classes shall have the rights, privileges, and prerogative of regular membership in the Student Union.

(a) Student Membership, which shall consist of all students enrolled in the University of Nevada who pay the Student Union fees established by action of the Union Board of Directors and approved by the Board of Regents. Such membership shall be valid for the period covered by the fees.

(b) Honorary Membership, which may be awarded by the Board of Directors to those members of the Student Union who served the union with outstanding distinction.

(c) Life Membership may be presented by the Board of Directors to benefactors of the Student Un-

ARTICLE IV **Board of Directors**

SECTION 1: The Board of Directors:

(a) The Board of Directors shall consist of seven Directors. Six elected Directors and one by virtue of his A.S.U.N. office: (a) President, (b) Finance Director, (c) A.S.U.N. Second Vice-President, and (d) four Directors-at-Large.

(b) A faculty advisor and the Student Union Director shall be non-voting ex-officio members to the Board.

SECTION 2: Term of Office:

(a) Three Directors will be elected each year for a period of two years. The term of each member shall begin on May 15, and shall continue for the stated period or. until acceptance of his resignation by the Board of Directors, or his removal from office for cause.

SECTION 3: Methods of Election of Members:

(a) Candidates shall be nominated by any member of the Board of Directors or the Activities Council on the basis of outstanding service to the Student Union.

(b) Other nominations may be submitted in writing to the Board of Directors by any member of the Student Union.

(c) Candidates will be reduced to 10 by the Board and these candidates will appear before the

Board for personal interviews at the next meeting following nomina-

Final selection of the new Board members will be made by the Board of Directors.

(e) All nominees to the Board of Directors must have an over-all grade average of 2.2 or higher.

SECTION 4: Method of Election of Officers:

(a) The officers (President and Finance Director) will be elected prior to May 15 by an electoral board composed of the retiring members of the Board, the continuing members of the Board, the new members of the Board, the outgoing A.S.U.N. Second Vice-President and the incoming A.S.U.N. Second Vice-President.

(b) The tenure of office for the President and Finance Director shall be one year, beginning May

SECTION 5: Duties:

(a) The Board of Directors shall be responsible for all policies, financial aspects, and the supervision of the program of activities.

(b) The Board of Directors shall also have the power to prescribe rules and regulations not inconsistent with this constitution, to govern all student union program activities, to govern the time and place of its own meetings, and to govern members and guests while in the Student Union building. SECTION 6: Meetings:

(a) The Board of Directors shall meet at least four times a semester. The President can call special meetings when necessary.

(b) Five members of the board shall constitute a quorum.

(c) Any member in good standing in the Student Union has the right to attend the Board of Directors meetings.

SECTION 7: Method of Removal (a) Every Director is subject to recall from the Board of Directors. Not less than twenty-five (25%) percent of the Student Union members shall file their petition, naming the Director to be recalled, and stating the reasons why said recall is demanded. An election shall be held within twenty (20) days after the issuance of the petition to determine whether the Student Union members will recall said Director. On the ballot at said election shall be printed verbatim as set forth in the recall petition, the reasons for demanding the recall of the Director, and the Director's justification of his course on the Board of Directors. A two-thirds vote of those members voting shall constitute a decision.

SECTION 8: Vacancies:

(a) Vacancies occurring on the Board shall be filled by a majority vote of its members.

SECTION 9: Referendum and

Initiative: (a) Whenever ten (10%) or more of the Student Union members shall express their wish that any action of the Board of Directors be submitted to a vote, the Board of Directors shall submit the question of the approval or disapproval of said action to the be voted on at a special election to be called within twenty (20) days. A two-thirds vote of those members voting shall constitute a decision.

(b) Whenever ten (10%) percent of the Student Union members shall propose any action or measure, it shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to submit this action or measure to the Student Union members by calling a special election within twenty (20) days. A two-thirds vote of those members voting shall constitute a decision.

ARTICLE V **Activities Council**

SECTION 1: Method of Appointment:

(a) The Activities Council shall be composed of the chairmen of the standing committees, the chairmen being appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors.

(b) The President of the Board of Directors will preside over the meetings of the Activities Coun-

(c) The Activities Advisor will act in an advisory capacity and be an ex-officio member to the Coun-

SECTION 2: Duties of Activities Council:

(a) To coordinate and integrate the social, cultural, and recreational programs of the Union.

(b) To submit an annual budget to the Board of Directors prior to May 15 for the ensuing fiscal year. Individual committee budget revisions may be presented to the Board of Directors for approval at any time.

SECTION 3: Meetings: (a) The Council shall hold regu-

lar meetings twice a month and special meetings when deemed necessary by the President.

(b) Any Student Union member may attend meetings.

ARTICLE VI President

SECTION 1: Qualifications:

(a) The President of the Student Union shall be a member of, and elected by majority vote of the Board of Directors. The A.S.U.N. officer may not hold the office of President.

(b) He shall have an over-all grade average of 2.2 or higher. **SECTION 2: Powers and Duties:**

(a) He shall preside over all meetings of the Board of Directors and the Activities Council.

(b) He shall be an ex-officio member of all Student Union com-

(c) He shall have the power to appoint the chairman of all standing and special committees with the approval of the Board of Direc-

(d) He shall coordinate the work of all committees and maintain a balanced program.

(e) It shall be his duty to see that the By-Laws of the Student Union are carried out.

(f) He shall have the power to remove a committee chairman for cause, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

(g) He shall maintain office hours in the Student Union. SECTION 3: Salary:

The President shall receive a salary, the amount of which shall be determined by the Board of Directors with the approval of the Union Director, not to be inconsistent with the A.S.U.N. student SECTION 4: Method of Election: (See Article IV—Section 4.)

ARTICLE VII Finance Director

SECTION 1: Qualifications:

(a) The Finance Director shall be a member of, and elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. The A.S.U.N. officer may not hold the office of Finance Di-

(b) He must have an over-all grade average of 2.2 or higher. SECTION 2: Duties:

(a) When necessary, he shall act in the capacity of Vice-President.

(b) He shall be responsible for budget coordination for the Activities Council and the Board of Di-

(c) He shall countersign all purchase requisitions.

((d) He shall submit regular reports to the Board of Directors on the Student Union's financial con-

(e) He will submit for publication the approved annual budget to the University of Nevada Sagebrush. SECTION 3: Method of Election:

(See Article IV-Section 4.)

ARTICLE VIII Secretary

The Secretary shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors to take minutes at the Board and Activities Council meetings, and to carry out any duties deemed necessary by the

ARTICLE IX Union Director

There shall be a Student Union Director to be appointed by the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada. He shall be responsible to the Board of Regents through the proper University officers for the conduct of all business concerning the Student Union, and shall provide leadership in building an outstanding Student Union pro-

ARTICLE X Method of Amendment

SECTION 1: Proposal:

(a) An amendment must be placed on the ballot if: (1) proposed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, or (2) proposed by petition signed by 25% of the members of the Student Union. SECTION 2: Notification:

(a) Notification of amendment must be posted at least ten days in the Student Union building prior to the time of voting.

(b) Notification of amendment must be submitted for publication in the University of Nevada Sagebrush prior to the time of voting. SECTION 3: Voting:

(a) The Student Union constitution may be amended by a twothirds vote of those members vot-

(b) Voting shall be by secret ballot, at a time and place designated by the Board of Directors. SECTION 4: Amendment of the

By-Laws:

The By-Laws of the Student Union may be amended by a majority vote of the Board of Directors at any regular meeting.

Another possible Olympic athlete from the University of Nevada is erstwhile football player Martin Murphy who has been training for a spot on the weightlifting team.


