

Hunting season is here. Students, break out your scattergun and a box of shot and keep an eye out for turkeys, quail and any other fowl that is fair game.



At the same time that the U.S. space effort was performing its latest achievement in orbiting two men in space, the Nevada legislature voted to eliminate progress in the field of science at the University of Nevada by vetoing construction of a physical science building on the Reno campus.

While astronauts Grissom and Young were orbiting the earth in their spectacular advertisement of America's great progress in science, the committee chairmen of both houses agreed to eliminate the approximately \$3.2 million needed for construction of the building.

of the University Board of Regents, has voiced his disapproval of the legislature's move, stating that the young people of the state are being shortchanged by the cut. "The building is needed at this time and the legislative denial of funds will put the physical sciences facilities at the university in a definite bind," said Dr. Lombardi.

Although the Assembly Ways and Means Committee reconsidered the appropriations bill and restored many of the university budget cuts, it was unable to justify the needed funds for bringing Nevada a little closer to national standards in the fast-moving science field.

"We will debate," said Max Steinheimer speaking for the University of Nevada debate team. Wednesday night the debaters withdrew from competition in the Nevada-sponsored Great Western Debate Tournament as a protest against Coffin and Keys, secret men's society on campus.

"Our purpose has been fulfilled," said Steinheimer. He said President Armstrong Thursday morning assured the the debaters of a public investi-

gation of Coffin and Keys.

Before leaving for a speaking engagement in Sacramento, University President Armstrong told the Sagebrush that acting Vicepresident Dr. Ralph Irwin and Dr. Sam Basta, dean of student affairs, will conduct a complete investigation of the matter, not of the group in question.

STUDENT CONCERN

"I also told the debate squad their differences with Coffin and Keys was a matter of student concern and should be settled by legally conducted student government," said Armstrong. "If it cannot be resolved then it will become a proper concern of the administration."

In a Thursday meeting with debaters, Armstrong urged them to reconsider their action of withdrawing from the tournament "so as not to bring embarassment upon the University of Nevada."

"We are counting on Jinx Dabney to open the door to the activities of Coffin and Keys," said Steinheimer. Dabney, ex-president of the secret group, had already made mention of certain activities to the debate team.

PHYSICAL VIOLENCE

Dabney, also a debater, said he has received five phone calls and one personal encounter threatennig physical violence if he "talked" about Coffin and Keys. Ex-IFC President Jim Baker, Coffin and Keys member, reportedly made the physical threat to Dabney.

"I did not threaten Dabney," said Baker. "I told him, not as a member of Coffin and Keys, that I questioned his character in regard to his tactics."

Baker said his communication with Dabney was as an individual, not as a member or spokesman for any group. "I don't feel I was threatening him and said nothing to imply any action by me or anyone would be taken against him."

INTO THE OPEN

Dabney is supposedly going to bring the "secrets" of Coffin and Keys into the open with a public statement to be issued soon.

"Our main objection to the group is the potential danger of it's secrecy and the things they could do," said Steinheimer. "It is very possible they can control student elections."

Debater Demar Dahl denied that it was the Senate-approved veto of a dollar allotment to debate that caused the concern. He said, "We debaters do not feel we can represent a University which has such an organization."

ACADEMIC STALEMATE

Mike Lally, defeated candidate for ASUN President and public relations chairman for the debate tournament said Coffin and Keys "has created an academic stalemate at this University."

"We are not living in a democracy," said Lally, who came to the United States from Ireland eight years ago.

Further attacks against Coffin and Keys came from debate coach Ken Mosier who said that the secret group was "a Ku Klux Klan-type of thing."

A LOT OF GOOD

"We know Coffin and Keys does a lot of good things on campus," said Steinheimer. "But even though they act as individuals, they function as one secret unit."

The main charges brought against Coffin and Keys by the debate team are:

- 1. It is a secret organization.
- 2. Faculty members are involved and influencing student mat-
- 3. The group impairs freedom of speech on minority positions.

"The investigation started while the debate allotment question was still in finance control board," said Steinheimer. "We heard then that Coffin and Keys was working against the debate cause."

VETO APPROVED

On March 24, Senate approved President Keith Lee's veto of a previous Senate decision which would allot one dollar per semester per student toward the debate prgram. The vote was 18 to 11 in favor of the veto.

The original vote, made March 3. was 27 to 1 in favor of the allocation. Lee vetoed the measure on the basis that the set allocation would take away to the constitutional purpose of Finance Control Board, which budgets appropriations for ASUN activities.

Michon Maupin, senator and ASUN second vice-president elect, told the Sagebrush, "I was not influenced or approached by any member of Coffin and Keys. I voted on my own volition and always have."

"I think other Senators would say the same thing," said Miss Maupin. She was one of the 18 who upheld Lee's veto.

DEBATE CHARGES

In a prepared press statement, the debate team charged:

"We feel that membership in this group by student body officers is contrary to their responsibilities as elected representatives of the students. We feel this because when a student body officer must reject his oath to the student body and accept instead his oath to Coffin and Keys."

ASUN President Keith Lee is a member of Coffin and Keys, as well as other male campus lead-

The debate statement also reads: "Through concerted and surreptitious activity, this group functions as the invisible student government at the University of Nevada; their influence can be felt in all phases of student affairs."

RIDICULOUS CHARGES

Kent Folgate, Coffin and Keys president, said Wednesday night (Continued on page 4)

(Continued from page 3) that the issue and charges were "ridiculous and unfounded." He said he would answer any charges made against the group.

Mike Ingersoll, ASUN president-elect, said there is nothing to the charges and agreed that the matter was "ridiculous." Ingersoll is a member of Coffin and

"They'll have to make more definite charges before we can answer anything," said Ingersoll.

The Coffin and Keys constitution, on file in the ASUN office, states that the aim of the organization is for the benefit and upbuilding of the University of Nevada.

C & K AIMS

"Our aim is by personal example and advice to improve the student life and activities: to act as a medium between faculty and student body; to do all in our power to help the reputation and raise the social, moral and scholastic standing of our University and to so conduct ourselves that under-classmen seeing the good in our organization will strive to the best of their ability to win, through their scholarship and school loyalty, the honor of wearing our emblem."

Debaters charge that "the existence of Coffin and Keys is an affront to the integrity of every student on this campus, for their actions imply that they-the 'secret chosen few'-doubt the ability of the student body to govern itself, that students are unable to make their own decisions regarding government, and that therefore, Coffin and Keys must make decisions for them."

PUBLIC DEFENSE

"When they opposed the debate allotment, they should have said so publicly and defended their point of view. They chose, however, to work secretly and cowardly, afraid to expose themselves to discussion," the statement reads.

"Debate is in no way responsible for the distribution of the leaflets on campus last week," said debater Frank Bass. "If we had been, we would have signed names just as we have in this statement," he said.

Voice Recital Set Sunday



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
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Academic Requirements Reach All-time High

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
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
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


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
