The Washoe County Republican Central Committee last week tabled a resolution seeking to ban the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) from the Nevada campus.

The motion to table was based on the premise that the gathering was "not representative" of the whole central committee. Only 50 persons attended the meeting.

Dr. John DeTar, a John Birch Society spokesman who proposed the resolution, charged alleged links between SNCC and Communist front activities and groups.

### NO CONFIDENCE

If SNCC were permitted to become established on the campus it would have expressed a vote of "no confidence" in the Board of Regents and the University administration and faculty.

However, Gordon Nelson, president of the campus Young Republican organization, said a group active on the campus were "friends" of SNCC, and not a constitutionally - organized chapter of it.

He stated that the members were interested primarily in the civil rights movement, and added:

"Most (students) have a lot of confidence in civil rights and very little in the Republican party."

Supporting Dr. DeTar's resolution was Charles Shields, who said he was afraid the organization would take root on the campus unless action were directed against it. He added his guess that students were opposed to SNCC five-to-one.

However, Nelson stressed that student activities on the campus have always been free and open, and would create no problem as long as they were permitted to operate in that fashion.

In commenting on the tabled resolution, ASUN President Mike Ingersoll said.

### BAN FREEDOM

"If this resolution were passed, it would ban freedom of speech. As long as SNCC members do not violate any University regulations or policies as a group, they have every right to exist and be accorded full University recognition."

ASUN First Vice-President Bill Chaffin commented.

"It seems strange that SNCC should not be allowed to exist when both the Young Republicans and Young Democrats are allowed on campus. Someone could allege that they have Communist links to front organizations as Dr. DeTar has done."

# To Ban SNCC From Campus Investigation Of **Coffin And Keys**

An interested group of students is seeking to gather information and verify facts pertaining to the recent Coffin and Keys issue on campus.

Steve Gomes, a member of the group, says they will hold an all-University meeting tomorrow night at 7 in the Truckee Room of the Student Union Building.

The purpose of the meeting will be to present reasons why Coffin and Keys should be either banned on campus or why members should choose between their campus leadership or their membership in the secret honorary organization.

Gomes says his group has access to and is in possession of formation that show definite past conflicts of interest in the Coffin and Keys membership.

Mike Lally, another member of the group, circulated a petition Friday stating what he believes to be the facts concerning the Coffin and Keys issue.

Gomes wants to see how many interested people are going to attend tomorrow night's meeting. Twenty are already going to show, says Gomes.

At the meeting the group will state their position publicly for the first time and tell why they are going to do.

He says that the group is in no way affiliated with the debate squad and is merely trying to clear the issue

# Editorial

## New Coffin And Key Investigation Should Show Something Concrete

An unofficial group of students have taken up the task of investigating Coffin and Keys, honorary men's secret society.

This group says they have access to and are in possession of evidence that shows a definite conflict of interest of Coffin and Keys members who are also student leaders.

The new investigating body implies that the allegiance leaders make to the student body is made void by a "gag rule" in the oath which Coffin and Keys members must swear to uphold.

In effect, the charges are an indirect question of trust of such individuals as Keith Lee, ex-ASUN president; Mike Ingersoll, ASUN president; Art Kess, ex-Blue Key president; Kent Folgate, Judicial Council Chief Justice; and numerous other leaders, including University professors and notable alumni.

These persons have earned their leadership by working in the best interest of the student body and have gained respect of their constituents by action and ideas approved by a majority of students.

Membership into Coffin and Keys does not come until leadership and scholarship qualities are proved. And this make-shift investigating body will try to present evidence that these men would throw their personal and political ethics to the winds in belonging to a secret organization.

If these self-appointed investigators can come up with some concrete evidence against leader membership in Coffin and Keys, they should be heard. But if they are going to base their conclusions on suppositions which have been beat into the ground this past month, their work will be to no avail.

# SNCC Head Says Group Hasn't A **Commy Tie**

Chairman of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, Nellie Maxey, says there has not been any evidence that her group is connected with communism. Miss Maxey's remarks came in reply to Dr. John DeTar's charge that SNCC is linked to communist activities and groups. Dr. De-Tar is spokesman for the John Birch Society.

The Friends of SNCC are planning a freedom rally Thursday evening April 29 in the Travis Lounge of the Student Union beteween 7 and 10 p.m.

NO CONNECTION

"The FBI, the House Unamerican Activities Committee and other incestigative bodies have not found any connection between civil rights groups and communism," says Miss Maxey, "I don't believe there is any connection.'

Miss Maxey says she respects the right of DeTar to speak out against SNCC. However, she says the people should remember that DeTar does not represent any official government body.

DeTar advocated at a Washoe County Republican Central Committee meeting that SNCC be banned from the Nevada campus. The resolution was tabled by the Committee.

#### FILM SHOWN

A SNCC produced film "A Dream Deferred" will be shown at the Freedom Rally Thursday. Also on the program will be a

speech by Dr. Jack D. Forbes, a Nevada history professor, who will speak on the background of civil rights.

Another SNCC official, George Winer, will talk on "six months on the Mississippi freedom project." Winter was arrested twice for his civil rights work in Mississippi and will report mixed feelings about the movement.

Winter will discuss the oppositions and problems he facedalong with the disappointments and frustrations.

## **U** of N Week Is Not Held This Year

The University of Nevada Week, initiated in 1964, to celebrate the academic achievements of the University of Nevada, will not be held this year.

# Swans Invade Kess' Island; **Hathhorn Invades Depths**

The swans have taken up residence on Kess' Island and Dean of Men James Hathhorn fell into Manzanita Lake in weekend activity around the University of Nevada's scientific body of water located between the Dining Commons and the residence halls.

Hathhorn took an excursion out to the Blue Key-created island to provide hay for swans' nests.

The Dean of Men says he stepped out of the rowboat onto what he thought was a rock. "The next thing I knew I was in the water and the rowboat had gotten away," said Hathhorn. However, the dean managed to regain his craft and returned to the mainland.

### NESTING CARRIER

"I believe the ducks and swans need more cover to nest." said Hathhorn, "so I took out a couple of bales of hay."

Hathhorn says he saw the swan egg which was rumored to be on the island-which leaves future hope for more fowl on the lake. 'The island could be a little bigger," said Hathhorn. "Most of the footing was fairly firm.'

### GRADUALLY SINKING

There seems to be one small problem with Kess' Island. Like the legendary Atlantis it is grad-

ually sinking below the rippling surface. The island is about half as big as it was originally.

Past Blue Key president Art Kess-for whom the island is named-says he thinks the island ha sstopped settling.

Kess' Island is part of Project Mud which was started by the men's honorary society to beautify the lake. The island portion of the project was completed a month ago.

#### LOWER LEVEL

Kess says that Blue Key plans to lower the level of the lake and do some more work on the shrinking island. Planks will bridge the gap between the islet and the shore so Blue Key pledges can carry soil out to bolster and reshape the island.

Blue Key members are contemplating planting some shrubbery on Kess' Island—if it's all right with the ducks.

The Blue Keyers hope to settle the island problem to keep the island from settling in order for the lake fowl to settle permanently.

As of Sunday night the 20-foot island was still intact. The swans ducks were waddling happily about the island, and all was quiet and peaceable on the moonlit, tranquil lake.

# 'Seventh Seal' Seen Tonight





# Track Team Keeps Undefeated Mark

The undefeated University of Nevada track team ran up another victor yin Mackay Stadium Saturday and the Wolf Pack swamped Humboldt State, 126-19.

Nevada will travel this weekend to Sacramento to meet the defending FWC champion Sacramento tSate Hornets on Saturday in the most crucial dual meet of the season. The Hornets are the team to beat in the FWC according to Silver and Blue coach Dick Dankworth.

Also competing unofficially in theh meet was Sonoma State. The California squad was able to garner only one point during the afternoon, a fourth place finish in the 440-yard dash.

### OVERCAME ABSENCES

The Wolf Pack overcame the disadvantages of a three-week competition lay-off and the loss of stalwarts Otis Burrell and Alex Darnes. Darnes was sick and Burrell went to Des Moines via an invitation to the Drake Relays where he placed second in the high jump. The beautiful weather aided the Silver and Blue track men in winning every event but the triple jump and smashing several records.

Defying a Nevada sweep was Lumberjack thinclad Tom Farmer who leaped 46' 10" to win theh triple jump and establish a new meet record.

Even though theh Wolf Pack was only occasionally pressed by theh weaker opposition, Nevada athletes excelled in breaking hree school, three stadium and four meet records in wrapping up their one-sided victory.

### RECORD BREAKER

Bettering Doc Williams' school record in the pole vault was Ryan Melton who soared 14' 7%" to top the old mark of 14' 6½". Melton's vault also topped Williams' Mackay Stadium record of 14' 6" and Biffle of Humboldt State's record.

Three Nevada sprinters beat the school record i nthe 220-yard dash. Leading the group was Dick McCoy who blazed through

A new school, stadium and meet record was also established in the 440-yard relay. McCoy, Prosser, Houston Williamson and Phil Henrikson ran the quartermile in 41.7 seconds. That mark topped the recognized mark of 42.9 seconds held by Sacramento State, but will not count as an FWC record because it was not set in a FWC meet.

Williamson won two other events, the 100-yard dash and the broad jump His winning time in the century sprint was 9.8 seconds and he leaped 24' 3½" in taking the broad jump.

Wolf Pack's Walt Laurin also established a new meet record in theh 330-yard intermediate hurdles with a time of 38.5 seconds.

# Wolf Pack Splits With Sacramento In FWC Action


Nevada handed Sacramento's baseball team its first Far Western Conference loss of the season by defeating the Hornets, 5-4, in the first game of a double-header. Sacramento won the nightcap 3-0.

In the opener, Nevada won in the last inning. Stan Owens was safe on an error, and a bunt by Owen Toy and a double by Bob Gillham enabled him to score.

Carl Bossieux received the win for Nevada, while Jim "Spider" Thomas received his first conference loss of the season. He had pitched 26 consecutive scoreless innings prior to facing Nevada.

Nevada's nine-hit attack was led by Earl Nursement, who had three hits, and Stan Owens, who had two.

In the second game, Nevada outhit the Hornets 6-5, but was shutout 3-0. A walk, an error and a double by Jim Thomas gave Sacramento two opening runs. Cost for the affair is \$2 per person. Tapping will begin at 12 noon, with the golf competition beginning at 1 p.m.


# Sigma Nu Takes Swimming Meet




