Haiti's New Constitution Roumania Ousts Religions Council Studies Protocol

That American armed forces had been used in Haiti to force a new constitution upon the people which would permit the ownership of land by foreigners, was charged before the subcommittee of the Senate foreign, relations committee in a hearing on the Ladd resolution this week. The resolution is designed to prevent the United States government from supervising the financial arrangements between its citizens and other countries and to provide against the use of its military forces to compel the observance of such obligations.

When the Haitian Assembly refused to accept the new constitution, it was dissolved upon order of the commander of the United States Marine Corps there at that time, and a plebiscite held which was controlled by the marines. Immediately after the adoption of this constitution, American land companies took over large tracts of the best land, which had been in the families of the natives and handed down from father to son for generations, but for which they were not in possession of title.

The Roumanian Ministry of Arts and Worship has issued a decree suppressing or curtailing the activities of so-called "minority religions" in Roumania. a A list of the forbidden sects includes the Reformed Adventists, the Apostolic church, the Milenests, the Nazarenes, the last named being a sect of Hungarian origin whose followers refuse to take oaths, perform military service or in any way participate in the country's political life. The grounds for forbidding the exercise of these religions is that they are a menace to public order. Baptist and Seventh Day Adventists may "continue to enjoy the liberties accorded by the Constitution, but certain measures of surveillance will be taken regarding these two religions."

The Roumanian constitution adopted in 1923 theoretically provides for the free exercise of religion throughout the new kingdom, but at the same time guards very carefully the prorogatives of the National Orthodox (Greek Catholic) church.

The heavily charged agenda for the League of Nations Council, which meets in Geneva next Monday, has just been announced. The council will be presided over by a British representative, presumably Austen Chamberlain, whose communication on the result of exchange of views between the British Imperial government and the Dominions on the question of the Geneva arbitration protocol is one of the principal subjects for consideration. Another matter is the council's right to carry out investigations into the disarmament situation in Germany, Austria, Bulgaria and Hungary.

The Greek government has drawn the Council's attention to the dispute with Turkey concerning the Occumenical Patriarch as a matter likely to disturb international peace and Turkey has been asked to send a representative not only to assist in the Council's clucidation of this problem, but also to discuss the situation regarding Turkish minority in western Thrace and the Greek secondary. "DREAMS OF AN ASTRONOMER"
Camille Flammarian

Flammarian's book is interesting for Itwo reasons. The first source of interest lies in the charm of the language and the pieturesqueness of the imagery. In the second place, the great French astronomer's coglation, his invisings and reflections, have the elements of interest and attraction which the writing of most real thinkers possess.

As the title suggests, "The Dreams' consist largely of the scientific introspections of a trained observer. But the book goes much farther. Beginning on safe, well known ground, Flammarian wanders far astray into a territory over which rages ceaseless warfare between La Placian hypotheses followers and believers in the Planatesimal hypotheses.

Unfortunately the book was written some, 20 years ago. The copy at hand is merely a new edition, unrevised. Most of the present day astronomers and geologists no longer accept many of the hypotheses lain down by Flammarian, so perhaps his dismal picture of dead planets revolving in regular orbits about the sum will never be true.

Detached from the context many of his theories are apt subjects for considerable speculation, but on the whole the boook is a rather unsafe guide, in the light of existing theories.

She goes out to a squalid Dujch settlement in one of the New England states to teach school, and in a short time, crushed to a point of weariness by poverty, she becomes blinded to her ideals and beauty, and marries a stolid Dutch farmer for the sake of a home. A few years later he dies, and she is left to eke out a meagor existence for herself and her son, whom she calls "So Big," on the small farm left her by her husband. Through hard work and self sacrifice, she manages to educate her son and puts him through college, but with his education comes the loss of love and respect for his mother.




