According to notice received by Frederick Green, professor in the College of Law, all incorporated fraternities who color olemorgarine for table purposes are liable to a tax of 10 cents a pound, and an annual license

purposes are liable to a tax of 10 cents a pound, and an annual license fee of \$600.

Non-incorporated fraternities are not liable to this tax as the law regards them as private families who purchase supplies through appointed members of the group. Stewards of incorporated fraternities who saved money by serving olemargarine are tossed on the horns of a dilemma—to save the fraternity money and take a chance with the law, or obey the law and incidentally make the members pay the added cost.

Bunker Hill, Bull Run, Valley Forge—disciplined Redcoats were passed and the "embattled farmers." Vivid flashes these, that history brings us of the war which gave our nation birth. And this war of independence was fought and blood was shed, all for the right to vote. A century and a half ago our forefathers died for this right and today we pass it up as we would a disagreeable task. Yesterday at a student body election 179 votes were cast out of a possible 750 who had the right to vote.

It is often said by those who uphold the merits of the smaller university that it is apt to be more democratic in character. Student bodies of Nevada's size are theoretically supposed to be practically 100 per cent behind student activities, including elections by that group. Yesterday a bare 23 per cent of the A. S. U. N. DOUBTEDLY BE "BARCELONA." members cast a cote and fully half of that number had to be inveigled into the performance by personal requests.

It is not unlikely that many of those eligible to vote passed their duty with the excuse that it mattered not much to them which candidate was elected to office. Perhaps they were right as to the men in choice. One man might have been able to perform as equitably as another on Finance Control committee. Where such students are wrong, however, was in the decision to forego casting a ballot for the reason given.

Students of the university of today are expected to take the helm of leadership in the world of tomorrow. Leadership in a democratic country such as ours carries with it responsibilities in the exercise of suffrage. Leadership applies as well to politics as "BRODIE" — because it has bad to the more concrete sciences of life. In training to assume such breaks responsibilities, then, it certainly does not help to pass up student body elections while in college. The present case does not determine a vital issue, it is admitted. Nevertheless right now is certainly an opportune time to forget the "don't care" attitude in regard to the democratic institution of popular vote and resolve to cast a 100 per cent vote at future A. S. U. N. elections.
