TOTAL FIGURES REACH RECORD AT COMPLETION OF ENROLLMENT

TWELVE STATES AND SIX FOREIGN COUNTRIES REPRESENTED

NEVADA STUDENTS SHOW INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR

With registration figures reaching a total of 869, the largest enrollment in the history of the University of Nevada is recorded this semester, showing an increase of 32 over the 1925 figures, and 39 more than last year. The highest previous mark was reached in 1925, when 837 were enrolled. This year continues the steady in-

This year continues the steady increase which has been going on since 1918, just after the war, when 241 students were enrolled.

This year's registration lists 524 men and 345 women. Of the entire enrollment, 60.3 per cent are men. This ratio has remained constant within 2 per cent during the past ten years, according to a statement from the registrary's office.






