

Alpha Tau Omega Host to Campus With Open House

First Fraternity-Built House At Nevada Accommodates Forty Members

Alpha Tau Omega fraternity will open the doors of its home to the public with an open house from four to six tomorrow afternoon. This will give an opportunity to those who wish to view the interior of the first fraternity-built house on Nevada Campus an opportunity to do so.

Although the grounds in front of the house have not yet been put into condition the inside has been completely furnished and made fit for occupancy and now accommodates forty members. The first floor living rooms have been made homelike with the placing of furniture and rugs. Two large chess-boards, a baby grand piano, and large Morris chairs add charm to the rooms. A large oak horseshoe table accommodates the entire membership of the fraternity and guests. It may be placed in oval shape for special dinners.

Tinted Ivory

The walls are finished in colonial style carrying out the plans of the entire structure. The woodwork is tinted ivory, while the fireplace and mantel carry out this same tone. The windows are curtained with harmonizing beige drapes.

The second floor sleeping porches and study rooms are decorated in gray with bright chintz drapes on the windows. Spacious closets are provided for clothing, and a large washroom with three showers completes the second floor.

On the third floor four dormitories and a study room are located, all carrying the gray coloring of the floor.

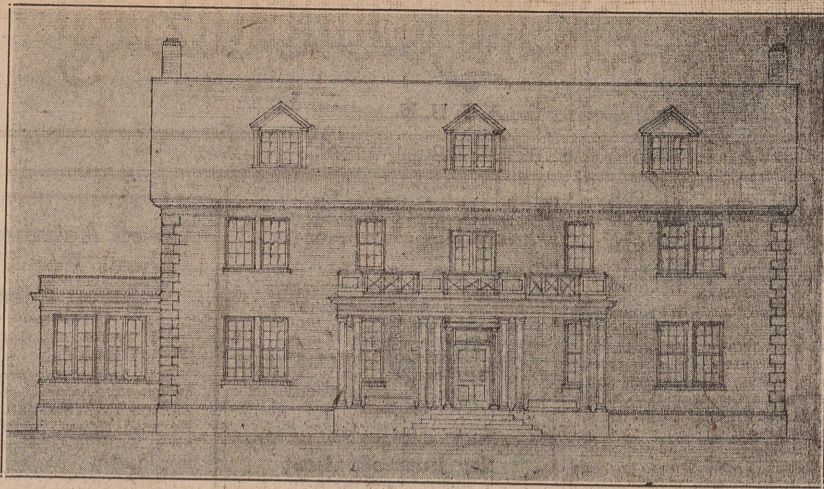
In the near future work will begin on the terracing of the ground in front of the house and the planting of a lawn.

Sophomores Take Football Contest Staged Field Day

Roy Bankoffier Proves Score Man for Second Year Team Saturday

Old Men Are Played Madriaga Breaks Through Line To Block Tupper's Kick, Gain Ground

The first grid clash of the current year was put on ice Saturday afternoon when Roy Bankoffier, sophomore wing, tore around the line on an end around play, and galloped across the final chalk mark for the lone score of the frosh-sophomore battle on Mackay field. The game was featured by the usual raggedness which characterizes early season football, both sides kicking the ball around plenty.

Score Comes Early
The score came early in the second quarter, after the sophomore aggression had taken the ball in mid-field and worked it down to the 30 yard line. On a perfectly executed end play, Bankoffier took the ball around the short side, while the entire frosh backfield was chasing the play around the long side. The sophomores failed to convert, and the score was 6-0, and remained that, as neither side was able to push the ball across the final mark during the rest of the game.

The first break came early in the first quarter when Madriaga broke through the sophomore line to block Tupper's kick. The ball was recovered by the frosh deep in sophomore territory. A pass from Gorse to Bloedell was completed for a 30 yard gain putting the frosh within scoring distance. The sophomore line held, and the frosh lost the ball on downs. The sophomores promptly kicked out of danger, and once more the battle waded in mid-field.

Veterans See Action
While the team was called the sophomores, several veterans of last year's Pack saw action, and Jack Walthers all but stole the show. If Jack keeps up the pace that he started Saturday this sheet will be picking him for all-American before the snow flies.

"Silent Mickey" Gorse, frosh back, played some nice football. He looked like a real find behind the line, and flings a long and accurate pass. His teammate, Hutsonpillar, worked out nicely at guard, playing good defensive ball, and breaking thru the line to block a couple of punts.

"Red" Handley, promoted from last year's frosh squad, was the shining star of the sophomore backfield. The big redhead looks larger and faster than he did last season, and can be tagged as a likely looking prospect. He is a good defensive player. When he hits 'em, they know they're tackled. Dick Tupper, letter man of last year, showed that he had not forgotten any of the tricks during the summer, and maybe learned a few new ones. There was at least once when Dick was the only sophomore between the frosh and the goal line, but the frosh didn't score.

Chris Stockton, a fullback who was drafted to fill in at guard last season, was back behind the line again, and looked more at home there. Chris is a little small for a line man, but his

High School Grid Schedule Drawn at Coach Conference

Each Game Played Will Count On Percentage Basis For This Year

Western Nevada high schools presented a full representation at the quarter annual meet of high school coaches and athletic directors held last Saturday at the Mackay training quarters to draw up a schedule for the 1929 football season.

Inaugurating a new system of determining just who the champions shall be at the end of the season, the coaches decided that each game played shall be a conference game, and that at least four conference games shall be played by each team.

The added ruling was accepted only in the case of Winnemucca, Coach Lowry at that point objecting on the grounds that the school was too far away to bring four conference teams there.

Taking this matter into consideration, that Winnemucca should play but three conference games was adopted.

Football teams this year will rate on a percentage basis.

The Nevada completed schedule is as follows:
September 28—Virginia at Reno; Winnemucca at Lovelock; Carson at Stewart.

October 12—Winnemucca at Fallon; Carson at Lovelock; Sparks at Stewart.
