#### **Editor**:

Whit Burnett once said "There are a lot of words in this world, and many of them are lying around loose." I have been reminded of this several times recently upon reading public statements about tenure at UNR. One of the loose words frequently used by those commenting on the subject is "deadwood," most recently by Mr. Banwart in the Sagebrush of March 5, 1974. If by "deadwood" is meant incompetent professors, then I suggest that even with tenure these can be removed after a charge has been made and a fair hearing given. If there are professors on this campus so incompetent that even the Chairman of the Board of Regents can make public charges ("deadwood" again) against them, I suggest that indiscriminate charges against a group, or a system, will not correct the situation. A fairer method would be the placing of specific charges against specific individuals and trusting to another system, our system of fair hearings.

I further suggest that it is not the system of tenure that is at fault. The system of tenure has served the cause of higher education in this country for over 80 years and served it well. If the product of the system is sometimes bad ("deadwood"), the fault lies not in the system but in the manner it is operated. A few years ago our democratic system of fair elections brought Mr. Nixon to the White House. I have read and heard of many attempts to correct the result of this election and of attempts to insure that it never happens again. I have not heard, however, of anyone seriously suggesting that we give up our form of self-government in favor of another just to get rid of Mr. Nixon and his companions.

Another facet of this discussion is that many of those who recommend doing away with the tenure system at the same time mention "job security" as a substitute. No system I know of has made "job security" more effective for the job holder than governmental civil service systems. I recommend the reading of our own Nevada state civil service provisions. In this system, it is almost impossible to get rid of someone after six months or a year. At least tenure requires a six-year probationary period.

PROFESSOR ELOY LECEA PLACER


BORN: April 19, 1914 in Spain.

I am committed to providing as many activities as is physically, financially, and lawfully possible for the students.



# **Activities Board**

The March 6 meeting of the Activities Board was called to order at 5:10 p.m. Tyler Shepherd was excused from the meeting. The minutes of Feb. 27 were approved.

**Budget Requests**—The board heard a request for \$100 to help defray costs to bring Professor Kenneth Porter to campus to speak. Professor Porter is from the University of Oregon, and has written books on black history. Dr. Rusco, presenting the request, explained that he has received funding from three other sources. Anne Zappettini moved to approve the request. Terry Reynolds seconded the motion, and it carried with none (0) opposed.

Old Business—Paul Wilford, chairman of Winter Carnival, presented his final report. He said that the majority of comments he received about the Carnival were favorable. The board thanked and commended Wilford for his work.

The board reviewed concert offers for the remainder of this semester. Of particular interest was an offer from Cheney Productions for the group, "Grateful Dead," on May 10 or 11 with a ticket guarantee of 1,500 at \$4. Pete Perriera pointed out that the Coliseum is not available during those dates. However, an outdoor concert would be possible in Mackay Stadium. The board was interested in this concert but wished to lower the guarantee. Mike May moved to approve the "Grateful Dead" concert for May 10 or 11 outdoors with a 1,200 ticket guarantee at \$4. Bill Mecham seconded the motion, and it carried with three in favor (Joan Baker, May and Zappettini), two opposed (Pat Archer and Linda Bowman) and one abstention (Mecham). Karl Hahn reported that the Nikki Giovanni lecture was well received, and that about 500 people attended. Reynolds informed the board of the dinner-reception being planned by the Chancellor and the Regents for Clark Kerr, the ASUN speaker for March 14. It was pointed out that it would be impossible to have the customary dinner with the board, because of a time limit. Reynolds will ask for three more students to attend the reception-dinner, so that members of the board can attend.

Bowman passed out the new bumper stickers advertising the musical 1776. Further discussion followed about the complimentary ticket list of the play. No action was taken; the board will resume discussion at the next meeting.

New Business—Hahn reminded the board of Mackay Day, which will be held April 29 through May 4. Anyone interested in being on the committee should apply as soon as possible.

The board heard a request from Bob Morrison of the Arts Festival Board to use the \$1,000 allocated for the Festival for part of the costs of the 'Renaissance Feast.' The total cost of the performance and presentations will be \$2,000. There will also be food served, which will be optional to the audience, at \$5 per person. No charge will be made for the actual presentations.

Perriera explained that Dick Trachok has requested that the board choose one of the following dates for Homecoming 1975: Oct. 11 or Nov. 1. Perriera recommended Nov. 1, so that the committee would have more time in which to plan the events. The board concurred with this recommendation, and approved Nov. 1 as the date for the 1975 Homecoming.

# **ASUN Senate**

The March 6 meeting of the ASUN Senate was called to order at 8:07 p.m. Garth Colwell was excused from the meeting. The minutes of Feb. 27 were approved.

**Report of the ASUN President**—Terry Reynolds informed the Senate that he will have a full written report on the National Student Lobby Conference at the next meeting. He next reported on the Union Expansion Committee. He explained that the committee is currently discussing plans for relocation of the Health Service. He announced that another candidate for UNR President will be on campus to speak and meet with students Thursday at 11 a.m.

**Report of the Vice-President of Activities**—Vice-President Karl Hahn reviewed the Feb. 27 minutes. Linda Bowman pointed out that the section regarding complimentary tickets for the play, 1776 should be deleted, as the board wishes to have further discussion on this matter. A further correction was made to item D under new business (Delta Sigma Pi rerecognition) to read as follows: "... which opens membership to all students within the business college." Steve Shuss moved to approve with the deletion of the section on complimentary tickets and the correction to item D. Mike May seconded the motion, and it carried with none (0) opposed.

Under the actions of Activities Board of March 6, Hahn informed the senators that there

was only one item requiring approval. The item was a recommendation from the board that Mackay Misses be recognized. Tom Mayer moved to approve the action of recognition for Mackay Misses. Bowman seconded the motion, and it carried with none (0) opposed.

**Report of the Senate President**—Hank Nuwer of the Sagebrush was present to ask the senators' opinion regarding a photo of the "streakers" on campus this week. He explained that this particular photo was a frontal view of the streakers. A hand vote was taken regarding this matter, and five (5) senators were in favor of showing the photo of a back view only, six (6) were in favor of showing the frontal shot, but with certain appropriate areas blacked-out, and one (1) senator was in favor of the frontal view with no black-outs. Nuwer stated that the photo would be run with the appropriate areas blacked-out.

Steve Ranson presented his recommendation regarding housing for the athletes. It was pointed out that no action should be taken regarding Juniper Hall, as it is being considered for future union expansion. Mayer moved to refer this recommendation to the Student Services Committee. May seconded the motion, and it carried with none (0) opposed.

Steve Kent asked the senators to register their votes regarding a constitutional amendment about election of the Senate President after the meeting, so that this measure can be placed on the ballot for next week's election.

#### "Y" not participate?

The Students International Meditation Society is presenting an introductory lecture on Transcedental Meditation as taught by Maharishi Mahesh Yogi on Thursday, March 14 at 7 p.m. in the Hardy Room of the Student Union Building.

Maharishi Mahesh Yogi first began teaching this simple mental technique in the West over 13 years ago. Since that time over 5,000 individuals from all parts of the world have studied under the Maharishi to become teachers of T.M. -The purpose of the technique is to allow one's awareness to go within in a natural and spontaneous manner to tap the source of creative intelligence, thereby strengthening and enriching the thinking mind. At the same time it produces a deep state of restfulness in the mind and body thus allowing for the release of deep rooted stresses and tensions. T.M. is enjoyed for 15 to 20 minutes daily. The net result of this over a period of time is a rapid and natural growth towards the full expression of one's inherent potential and the harmonious integration of all aspects of life.





### **Tarnished Silver**

Maybe the University of Nevada should just skip 1974 and go on to 1975. Why? UNR's 1974 sports activities have gotten off to a disappointing start. The Silver and Blue have lost four of its five 1974 debuts.

These initial losses seem to be affecting the morale and the play of these teams.

It started in early January when Nevada's ring team was upset by the Golden Bears from the University of Berkeley, 6-3, in Nevada's 1974 debut. Although some aspects of the match were controversial, they still lost. The Pack ringmen ended their regular season with a disappointing record of 2-3. This initial ring encounter with conference foe, Berkeley, got the Pack boxers off to a poor start and eventually to a poor season's record.

The Wolf Pack baseballers had troubles opening their 1974 season on a successful note also. The Pack dropped a double-header to the University of Davis on Feb. 16. Since then the Pack nine has compiled a season record of 4-5.

Nevada lost a week of practice due to bad weather. This setback played a major role in the Pack losing its double-header with Chico State, March 5, and its game with San Francisco State March 8.

1974 has taken its toll on the Wolf Pack nine, but first year coach Barry McKinnon has a team filled with talent and a 1975 league championship is not impossible.

The UNR women had their debut troubles also. They traveled to Berkeley Jan. 26 and lost to the highly touted Bears. Nevada presently has a record of 1-4, which has recently been overshadowed by history making efforts by the Pack women. They placed sixth in the recent Northern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference basketball tournament-the highest a UNR team has ever placed in tournament play.

It's already March and some people are starting to give up hope for Nevada's sports, especially after the Nevada netters' debut was spoiled Saturday by the Fresno State Bulldogs, 7-2, on the Pack's home court. The loss overshadowed the fine talent that Pack coach Bob Fairman has on the tennis team. Freshman Bill Gardner was the Pack's lone singles winner, beating Fresno's Mike Ryan, 7-5 and 7-6.

The other Pack winners were Bob Wright and Tom Wood of the doubles team. The Nevada duo beat Fresno's Lew Brewer and Joe Hively, 1-6, 6-4 and 6-2.

The first two months of this year looked pretty grim for the Wolf Pack. But it's going to have to change and soon. Nevada's track and field team proved this Saturday in the Fresno meet.

UNR's team, with its perennial gifted ability to win, started its spring season off by compiling 113 points in the meet. Its nearest threat was host Fresno, who had a lonely 42 points. Fresno City College was third with 35 points.

This convincing victory by the Nevada trackmen could be the turning point for other Nevada teams to recover from early poor showings. Nevada will have to recover quickly from these earlier setbacks. The next couple of weeks will determine how Nevada will fare in the spring of 1974.

# Pack holds Frisco at Bay

The previously silent Wolf Pack bats echoed loudly Saturday in the stillness of the Bay Area atmosphere, as the Nevada nine broke a 26-inning scoreless skein by thumping San Francisco State 7-3 and 7-4.

After losing to SF State Friday, 3-0, Nevada broke out of its hitting slump with Mike Torres and John Staley leading the way.

In the first game, rightfielder Torres tagged three hits and drove in three runs to give the Pack the victory and break the three-game losing streak that had started on March 5 with the Chico State Wildcats.

Stew Colton and Rich Tucker joined together to limit San Francisco to six hits in the first game. Colton, an Illinois native, picked up his second win of the season. His record now stands at 2-1.



#### Kerr trouble recalled
