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# Sagebrushs Stolen

Perhaps the topper in an already ugly ASUN student election campaign was the theft of over half of yesterday's Sagebrush only moments after they were dropped off at their distribution points in various buildings on campus. That issue contained Sagebrush political endorsements and criticisms of several of the major candidates.

Business Manager Larry Winkler and Circulation Manager Barbara Norton have identified one person who they saw carrying a stack of copies from the Education Building and later saw throw a stack of papers into a dumpster near the greenhouses. About 150 of the estimated 2000 stolen papers were recovered from that dumpster. Only about 200 other papers were recovered from another dumpster.

The Sagebrush and ASUN business office have estimated the loss at \$650.00.

Winkler and Norton said they were first led to believe that someone was stealing papers when a stack of them disappeared from the Fleischmann Life Sciences building only seconds after delivery. Their suspicions were confirmed when the same happened in other UNR buildings and finally when a person was caught taking papers from the trunk of their car.

Norton and Winkler said they were able to make a positive identification. First from a Reno High School Yearbook, and later from a personal visit to the SAE house, the person they identified is a junior SAE fraternity pledge. Several other persons are believed to be involved, but as yet no identification has been made. Among those believed to have been involved in the thefts across campus include several ASUN senators.

A criminal complaint will be filed today with the University Police. Both the UNPD and the ASUN investigative office are investigating the theft. According to university police and ASUN investigator Greg Swain, the person who took the papers from the car could face felony theft charges, and students involved in taking stacks of papers from the buildings could face disciplinary action from the ASUN Judicial Council.

The suspect has denied any involvement in the incident, stating he was in several other places at the time. However, based on the identification at the SAE house, the two Sagebrush staff members are certain he was the one who took the papers from the education building and who later was observed throwing a stack of papers in the dumpster next to the greenhouse.


The two Sagebrush staff members noticed that throughout their route a fire-engine red Jeep was following them. It was this jeep which later led them and ASUN investigators to the SAE house where one of the alleged theives was identified.

Through a registration check, UNPD disclosed the owner of the jeep, and the driver was later identified. The driver, not a student, admitted to being on campus yesterday but denied any involvement. He did, however, give ASUN investigator Swain a list of six persons whom he knew in the SAE house. The Jeep had also been seen earlier in the parking lot of the SAE house by several students.

Swain said his investigation today will include talking to the six SAE's. He is scheduled to make a report of his investigation at tonight's Senate meeting.

Two major ASUN candidates are SAE members although both have denied either involvement or prior knowledge of the thefts. Jack Reinhardt, candidate for President and current Vice-president of Finance and Publications, said he believes whoever did it was "acting on a civil disobedience trip." He said he feels that their actions were a "protest to the Sagebrush editorial policies." Reinhardt couldn't say what effect this might have on the election. Pawl Hollis, vice presidential candidate and current Senate President, emphatically denied any involvement. Jim Stone, the other candidate for President, and Marc Cardinalli, candidate for Vice-president of Finance and Publications, expressed doubts that neither of the opponents had any personal involvement in the incident. Stone said he felt the people who did it had "misguided loyalties." Cardinalli agreed, saying it "doesn't seem to be a clean election."

Election Board Chairman Mark Fowler, who is also involved in the investigation, said this would not affect the elections, and they would still go on as planned. Fowler said that today's election will be valid unless "it is proven that someone in the major candidates camp had anything to do with it."

## Editorial

This editorial is unique for the student community in that it is a break from tradition. Normally, in past years the **Sagebrush** has refrained from taking sides in student elections.

Past editors were generally of the opinion that to present opposition or support for particular candidates was unfair to the majority of the students, not the candidates. It was felt that with only one campus newspaper students would have difficulty in choosing who they should vote for.

Instead, particular candidates were endorsed by Sagebrush columnists or staff writers, with space provided for guest opinions of opposing views.

Yet in the vast majority of election races, it was fairly well assumed that there were at least two qualified candidates running.

This year at UNR has also been unique. To most of us it has been a question of how could so many things go wrong in so short a time. Not only have three of our numbers been lost in senseless deaths, but ASUN has been plagued with in-house fighting and, in

several cases, ineptitude.

Because of the unusual nature of 1975-76, we at the Sagebrush feel that two of the candidates that are seeking executive positions are simply not qualified to take over the government, whatever their past accomplishments have been.

Jack Reinhardt is seeking the presidency of ASUN. He has served for the last year as V.P. of Finance and Publications, during which time he has developed a nasty habit of making editors tear their hair and eat their pencils.

Reinhardt was helpful in convincing the senate of the Sagebrush's plan to invest \$10,000 to save \$12,000 a year in printing costs. He was personable and appeared helpful.

But when the pressure came on, the problems started.

The Artemisia/Sundowner photo controversy was rough on everyone involved. Feelings and emotions on both sides were considerably strained. Yet, since we are for the most part stable people, we acted like adults in our relationships.

However, we feel Reinhardt was, in many cases, lacking in the maturity necessary to represent 8,000 students in an official capacity. The height of this was when Reinhardt simply walked out of a later Publications Board meeting after refusing to answer Artemisia editor, Bob Horn's, questions about the state of his discretionary fund. Whether the questions were valid or not is no excuse for behavior like that.

Reinhardt's unprofessional conduct has made his dealings with Publications and others difficult, if not impossible. During the Artemisia problems, Reinhardt refused to comment or make his position clear many times. This not only made communication next to impossible, but made our task of providing both sides of the issue difficult.

Reinhardt is being opposed by a newcomer, Jim Stone. Though Stone is untried in ASUN government, he has shown us a concern for making the upcoming year something

far better than this one has been. His newness to the scene of campus politics is probably his greatest attribute. His record is clean.

For us, these two represent opposites - A legacy of disagreement and uncertainty against a hopeful unknown.

The other race in which we have decided to make our position known is that of the V. P. of Finance and Publications in which Marc Cardinalli is opposed by Senate President Pawl Hollis.

Hollis has served the College of Agriculture well in the past two years as their senator. However, his involvement in student government this year has been a poor example of leadership as head of the student's legislative body.

After his involvement in the tragic death of John Davies, Hollis' attempts to run an unbiased senate failed miserably. This is evident by the record-setting number of times he passed his gavel (stepped down as Senate President to express his opinion) and the senate's subsequent attempt to abridge the freedom to portray an actual event.

Hollis' actions in front of the Board of Regents has also made us question his ability to provide competent student leadership. Finally, we must question Hollis' motives towards free press based on his record.

Cardinalli, on the other hand, has proved time and again his concern for the betterment of this campus. Not only does he support the free exchange of information, but he has been involved in the workings of both the press and the government in his part in establishing an ASUN Investigative Office. Though he has been vocal on several issues, he has at least been professional and courteous. Cardinalli has shown those that know him his ability to deal rationally in the day to day workings of student government.

In both of these races we feel there is a serious question of qualification. Not only have Reinhardt and Hollis shown a lack of maturity and leadership, but their records have proven their inability to represent the students adequately.

We have provided the candidates every opportunity to express their platforms and reply to our position. Our desire to stay out of elections as much as possible, is evident in our lack of commentary on the other races. In the case of the V. P. of Activities, we feel that both candidates are competent and both could do a good job of representing the student's interests.

Hopefully, as many people as possible will vote tomorrow. The polls will be open all day long in the Travis Union. But, when you vote, consider the possibility of another year of headaches and hassles, or the promise of some constructive advancements in the students rights, and more importantly, pride.

After all, you have to do it. We can't do it for you.

### **Editor's Note**

It is unfortunate that this special edition of the Sagebrush needed to be printed. Because of the theft of over half of yesterday's paper, not only have the candidates who are seeking office suffered, but the students have suffered, both financially and in their freedom to information. Those of us at the Sagebrush, regard such blatent disrespect for the student's intelligence and rights as intolerable.

This special edition was printed with the permission of the ASUN Senate, after a phone vote of 11 in favor, 2 opposed and 1 abstention.

A limited number of yesterday's issue will be available today at the Student Union and the Getchell Library. Finally, special thanks to Peggy Martin for being the foundation of communication in student government.

#### No Understanding

I was saddened to read in last week's Sagebrush that students involved in campus politics are not more supportive and understanding of each other's individual efforts and viewpoints.

Many things were brought up last week by Paul Gallo

in his column that need to be cleared up.

The death of John and close call of Gary has been the most tragic event of my life, and in my heart, I still regret it very much. It was not only the event itself, but the actions which followed that concern me.

When the Artemisia layout of John's memorial and the Sundowners were put together, there was a great

deal of controversy. This led to Senate action and lengthy Publications Board meetings, in which people involved were sidetracked with personal differences.

My elected job as Senate President is to chair meetings of senate in an unbiased manner and to insure the proper order of business. I have never, in my capacity as chairman, expressed any bias verbally or by my actions when holding the chair. I ran the meetings in proper order. That's my job. Even Editor Bob Horn agreed to this.— (See Quote)

When I supported the withdrawal of funds from the Artemisia, it was at a time when I could no longer see the continued threats on parents and families of Sundowners and other people involved.

I was trying to make the point clear that our student publications should carefully review what they print and be aware of what their impact would be on the readers.

Editor Bob Horn agreed that the particular layout did, in fact, have implications of guilt for one particular person. In view of this, and the threats on the Sundowner's and on his family's lives, Horn saw fit to change the layout. That was his own action.

When Mr. Gallo approached me and asked for the Sundowner's support of his Guatemalan Earthquake Relief Campaign, I was, to say the least, very surprised. I wouldn't have been so surprised had he asked for my individual help, but he asked that the Sundowners rally

Mr. Gallo has criticized and attacked the Sundowners as a club and individually. He saw no purpose in the club and did not think it should be in existence. Yet he felt that they should come out of the shadows and support this campaign, thereby gaining the approval of the public.

There seems to be a conflict involved here. The club has degenerated to nothing more than a few close friends, faced with massive legal actions and heavy criticism. However, Mr. Gallo seems to think that this action would cause a complete reversal of public opinion.

Let us face the facts. The Sundowner club is nothing more than a memory. With the problems facing the Sundowners, it would be next to impossible to resurrect the club. The first concern, of those involved, would be toward the memory of John, and I told Gallo this.

The quote itself was taken out of context, and was made in jest. Peggy Martin, ASUN Secretary, who was present at the time, agrees that the statement was not

made in a derogatory sense.

## An Account Of The Newspaper Theft

Barbara Norton and Larry Winkler followed their normal delivery route around the campus, starting about noon, one hour later than the paper is usually delivered. They delivered stacks of Sagebrush to Fleischmann Home Economics, the buildings around the quad, and then took the car loaded with the day's edition to Jot Travis Student Union and Getchell Library. After making the delivery to Mack Social Sciences and the science building complex, the route led them to the Mines building and the upper level of Scrugham Engineering.

They dropped about 100 issues in a stack by the door at the bottom level of Scrugham and headed to the College of Agriculture. Winkler took a handful of issues into the greenhouse, got back into the car and drove to Fleischmann Life Sciences building to put a stack by the door. He looked out the door to see Norton turn the car around, and when he looked back, the newspapers had disappeared. Winkler says he thought someone wanted to help distribute the copies in the building, so he put down another 50.

The pair drove up to the College of Education and turned off Evans Ave. down the roadway to the upper door. They saw a red Jeep with about five persons in it pointed towards Evans.

Winkler took papers into the building. At the same time, Norton looked into the rear view mirror and saw someone taking about 500 issues out of the trunk of the car, while Winkler was inside.

When Norton asked him what he was doing, the young man replied, "I'm helping deliver papers."

"Put those papers back right now," she demanded. He threw them back into the trunk

and went into the door as Winkler was coming out.

Norton shouted to Winkler that someone was trying to steal papers. Winkler looked and saw him with a blond-haired student coming out with about 200 papers taken from the doorway where they were left. The same person Norton had confronted took a hand-

ful of papers out of the trunk again as they ran by.
