Nevada Jam: Reno's Rock 'n' Roll Gamble

RENO, NEVADA

The young man in the tie-dyed painter's overalls sits alone in the center of a grassy slope on the University of Nevada campus waiting for the music to begin.

He has spent the past two days hitchhiking to Reno from Jackpot, Nev., in search of "the biggest little goddamn rock 'n' roll hippie festival Nevada has ever seen!" according to promoter Mick Sleazeau.

The kid from Jackpot breaks his vigil long enough to complain about the Rolling Stones' guitarist Keith Richard being denied a work permit by the Reno Police in reaction to a huge downtown street demonstration and ensuing brawl that involved both hippies and rednecks.

"Hey, man, dig it!" says the kid. "I came to Reno to rock 'n' roll. If I would known that the Reno pigs weren't going to let the Stones play, then I could of hitched a ride in a Peterbilt down to Tonopah."

The fate of Nevada Jam (billed originally as "A Week of Love and Sagebrush") is still very uncertain at the time of this writing. The Jam, it has been predicted, could become the biggest attended concert ever held in the west.

Promises made by the promoter of incredible jams by the top stars of rock 'n' roll have led to tales, rumor, speculation and downright bullshit about the latest band promising to appear at the Reno concert.

According to the spokesperson for Sleazeau Productions, negotiations for a Beatles' reunion broke

down when negotiators refused to consider accepting mobile home parks in lieu of cash payments for performing.

"I've left messages in London for Led Zeppelin to contact me but they haven't responded," be-moaned the weary rock promoter. "Fleetwood Mac has a previous committment that they can't cancel, but Johnny Rotten promised to put the Sex Pistols back together for this gig. I'm tellin' ya, man, these English rockers are impossible to work with."

Continued Sleazeau, "I managed to sign Ted Nugent. Says he really gets off playin' these kind of gigs. He's promised me at least two solid hours of brand-new, unrehearsed feedback!"



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
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

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

Rockin' in the Reno Rain

As we go to press, "Rolling Brush" has learned from an inside source that today's scheduled start of the first annual Nevada Jam will begin as planned, despite the showers in Reno last night.

Jam promoter Mick Sleazau reportedly has given his soundmen and roadies the green light for setting up a makeshift stage in the Manzanita Bowl of the UNR campus.

High in the Saddle, a local country-rock outfit, will begin the festival. Iron Butter-fly has apparently decided to go ahead and record a special two-hour version of "In-na-gadda-da-vita." Appearances by Elton John, Elvin Bishop, The Alpine Band, Kiss, the Dead Boys, the Sage Pistols and even Maxie and the Sharks have been organized, according to our sources..

Sleazau is reportedly expecting crowds in excess of 750,000 people, effectively doubling Nevada's population overnight.

The production company apparently experienced little difficulty in obtaining the concert permit from Reno officials when the city council learned that the concert would not need any water hook-ups or sanitary facilities.

The promoter has warned, however, that parking will be extremely limited. Concert goers coming from California are required to leave their vehicles at Donner Lake and then to register at one of the hospitality shelters set up in Verdi. Visitors from the east entering Nevada on I-80 should expect a 5-hour delay in Lovelock.

The new MGM hotel has requested that all acid flipouts and other drug overdosers seek medical treatment in the lobby of their new complex.



Actress and political activist Jane Fonda was forced to cancel her appearance at UNR Monday afternoon because of illness. Fonda was scheduled to deliver a two-hour lecture on "Economic Feminism" at the UNR Old Gym. Her agent called and cancelled the date about 9 a.m. Monday. He also cancelled her appearance in Las Vegas for the latter part of the week.

Bob Horn, ASUN public relations dir-

ector, said that her doctor had advised Fonda to stay in bed for an indefinite period. No mention was made about the nature of her illness.

Her agent said that Fonda usually manages to reschedule her missed appearances. Horn said that if this is so, it probably won't happen before fall semester.

ASUN contracted to pay Fonda \$3,000 for her lecture, but Horn said that the only money ASUN is out now if for that spent on publicity, which amounts to about \$250-\$300. When asked if the \$3,000 figure is comparable to what is paid other UNR celebrity speakers, Horn said, "Yes, the fee for lectures usually runs from \$2,250-\$2,500." As an after-thought he added that Ronald Reagan asked for \$6,000.

Energy talk planned

John Hammond, a noted researcher on energy, will present a public lecture entitled "Living Systems" on Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the Center for Religion and Life.


Hammond was a leader in the creation of path breaking energy-conservation code for Davis, Calif. In addition to the public lecture he will present one other program in Reno.

On Thursday at 1 p.m. he will partici-

pate in an informal discussion on architectural and design approaches to energy conservation and the utilization of solar energy. The program will take place in Thompson Student Services Center, room 107.

There will be a panel discussion and presentation on the utilization of alternative energy sources on Friday at 1 p.m. in TSSC 107. The presentations will be made by UNR faculty members and researchers at the Desert Research Institute.

Hammond, who has a degree in environmental studies from the University of California, Davis, is trained as a landscape architect. Currently, he is involved in three major projects. He has a Department of Energy grant to build models and monitor uses of passive solar cooling systems. He is also designing an energy-conservation subdivision for a private contractor. The homes, to be built south of Fresno, will utilize several types of solar and other advanced energy conservation techniques. He is also working on a guide for utilization of solar energy in subdivisions.



JOCK ROTS: Easy Listening

If you're in the market for some easy listening that'll build you up then let you down, then let your ears vaccilitate to the tunes on the debut album by the Pack Jock Rots, "Trachok Can't Dance but His Department Sure Rocks and Rolls."

When I first heard the opening number, "Cheap Seats for Carey," it struck me that maybe the tone of this haphazard production should be one of melancholy sadness. Then I realized that was the mood they

wanted to set you with. Consider these lyrics in "Cheap Seats": "Wyoming wanted my body, but Reno stole my heart/ So I gave up ten thousand more a year, 'cause UNR I could not part."

Side one picks up a bit as the duo of Foot and Basket team up for a jazzy piece titled, "The Vegas Hex." The tune reeks of bold, brassy interludes, but has nothing to back it up with: "Tark can't coach, and their football team sputters/But when they come up here, our ass they leave in the gutter."

About the strongest cut of the album is "Women, Women, Who Needs Women?" sung by Dickie T. The song immediately puts one in a nostalgic frame of mind. "I remember the good old days, when women weren't around/But now they're here and using our cash, that could be helping produce touchdowns."

The rest of the album goes steadily downhill. A piece which tries to relate the future of the UNR basketball program titled, "It's in the GPA," terribly lacks any real credibility; and the tune

by the missing guard titled "I Never Learned to Punch So Now I Watch the Games From the Stands Instead of the Bench," really lacks clarity.

In short, the entire is a real bummer. Be it noted—the UNR jock department should stick with cutting farts in the locker-room and not albums.

MAX IS BACK

"Max is Back" and this time he far surpasses his first effort which ended a little prematurely.

Following in the foot steps of

other stars seeking identity and purpose Milam recently returned from studying far eastern religions. His music with its lofty ballads and blazing rock crescendos is infused with that influence. And this album shows some of the bitterness associated with the collapse of his early

The album begins with a hard driving tumultous tune called "Bucky the Engineer," an obvious reference to the legendary railroad engineer Bucky Buchanan. Buchanan had a great influence on the early works of Milam and the silver haired rocker lets it be knows that he doesn't care for the railway. With train whistles in the background and voices of protest being drowned out by the rythmic drumming of the steam powered gavel, the piece culminates with the anguished cries of "Lady Justice" as she is ground under the wheels of "Bucky's Train."

Milam next turns his atten-

tion to the sadness of acute poverty and loneliness with the anguished strains of "Tryin' to Find a Job." The piercing sounds of the violins backed by the mournful sobs of the unemployed singer tear the living heart from the listeners chest. Although the number is definitely a downer, it again displays the many sides of this versatile story teller who doesn't mind laying the blame on everyone elses' doorstep.

Rounding out the all hit suffusion of hot wax is "In My Wake," the story of those hunted down and denied raises after the collapse of Milam's first effort. Somewhat surprising are the guest vocals by Harry Gianneschi and Bob Gorrell. This seemingly incongruous pair harmonize beautifully in the background although they weren't paid for their efforts.

Max is back is Milam's greatest effort thus far and displays the many facets of this heavily berated performer.


