FCB deals out a tremendous amount of money to student organizations each year, a situation that is beginning to come under fire as late.

Shumacher seems more aware of this situation and I feel he is working towards a matching-fund program that will curtail a lot of work to get going, but is a good concept.

This is Heidi Waterman's second try at an ASUN executive spot, having lost last year the presidency to Gregory Neuweiler. Schumacher remembers the problems of last semester and the fee increase. He also realizes there is now an excess of funds around and they must be properly taken care of.

The best way of being sure who your choices will be is to get out and meet these people. ASUN government controls an awful lot of money every year, it's vital you make the right choice. And by all means, vote! It only takes a second to cruise by the student union Wednesday or Thursday to cast your ballot.

Student elections just a popularity contest?

Student elections are mostly a popularity contest, according to many UNR students surveyed last week.

Each student was asked about his interest in the election, if he had a favorite candidate and if he thought there was any student interest in student government.

"There's no interest; the voting results answer that question," Dan Lee, 21, stated. "People go through the student union at least once a week, but never vote." Lee thinks part of the answer might be to have more polling places on campus.

When John Dick was asked if he thought the UNR student body took an interest in student government, he replied, "No, I don't think so. A few organizations (business, education,

fraternities) are interested because they want their people to represent them; they want to change things their way. But, the student body on the whole doesn't have any interest."

He also said, "A few people running are in it just for prestige; it's been like this in previous elections, too."

Dick said, though, he thought there is a trend starting of people who really care and want to do something about student representation.

"I don't know if they'll get elected, probably not, but at least they're starting to realize that we do need student representation, so it's bringing in more good people."

Dick, 21, said he doesn't follow the elections and probably won't vote this time.

The most common remarks made by students surveyed were that they thought the elections were mostly a popularity contest and they had no favorite candidates. One person said, "I don't know; I guess I feel as strong about one candidate as I do any of the others."

Kevin Hampson, a marketing major, is running for business senator. He said he thinks student elections "are a good idea, but more student participation is needed in campus elections; the student voting is low."

Hampson agreed the elections have been a popularity contest, but that the student body could be represented better this time if the candidates he supports get voted into office.

When asked why he supported certain candidates, Hampson replied, "Because they're smart, active in school, interested in school and I think they will do the best job."

Most of the students interviewed said they weren't really interested in the elections and didn't have many comments on how the university is being represented. One girl summed it up this way, "You're asking the wrong person; I don't follow it at all."

Peaceful life

This Saturday, Mar. 17, the Center for Religion and Life will sponsor an informal discussion day for students who wish to share their own particular ideas and visions for a Christian world. It will be a chance for UNR students to share their concerns about a just and peaceful world with each other.

The program will start at 9:30 a.m., with a CROP film about world hunger, followed by a presentation by Julie and John Christensen about "Pilgrim's Acre," a Christian community. After a potluck lunch, Eric Moon will make an informal presentation about justice in the prisons. The rest of the day, until about 4 p.m., will be devoted to a discussion on immediate goals for a better world.

Election foulup

Various breakdowns in communication, and other general inaccuracies resulted in last Friday's Sagebrush primary election result cover story.

The vote totals for the presidential and vice president of activities race were incorrect. The tabulation shown was only the at-large total so, although the positions of the candidates was correct, the totals were not.

In the presidential race, the correct totals are: Dave Ritch, 411; Scott Koepf, 235; Vince Jim Bernabei, 99.

In the vice president of activities race, the correct totals are: Liz Contri, 337; Bill Flangas, 221; Nick Furchner, 168.

In addition, there was a mistake in the number of people eliminated in the business senator race.

The Sagebrush reported that only six candidates qualified for the general election. The correct number is eight, with Paul Baily and Gary Fuller still in the running.

And, the numbers shown in the engineering race were the percentages, not the vote totals. The correct vote totals are: Michael Smart, 59; Greg Crossman, 20; Steve Bos, 14; Lisa Peel, 14; Dave Briney, 4.

Whalen Reno Engineer of the Year

Brian J. Whalen, director of the physical plant at UNR, has been named 1978 Engineer of the Year by the Reno Chapter, National Society of Professional Engineers.

He received the award Friday, Feb. 23, at the noon luncheon at the Reno Elks Club that wrapped up local observance of National Engineering Week.

Whalen, 46, joined UNR as assistant university engineer in 1958 when campus facilities were less than 600,000 square feet.

He was promoted to director of the physical plant in 1973 and continues to supervise campus facilities that have grown to over two million square feet.

He has been involved in planning and designing many major UNR facilities, including the Church Fine Arts Building, Getchell Library and Scrogam Engineering-Mines Building. He also worked on Nye Hall, Mack Social Science Building, the chemistry complex, Judicial College, Education Building, medical school complex and Lombardi Recreation Building.

He is currently working on planning and design of six projects, including the proposed business college building, new mines building and special events center.

Whalen was born in Long Beach, Calif., and attended public schools in Boulder, Nev.

He earned an associated degree from the College of Sequoias in 1952 and a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from UNR in 1957.

He is currently president of the Pacific Coast Association of Physical Plant Administrators, having been an active member of that organization since 1964.

Locally, Whalen has served on the Truckee Meadows Urban Transportation Committee since 1971, the Citizens Advisory Committee since 1972, and the Reno Sewer Bond Committee since 1976.

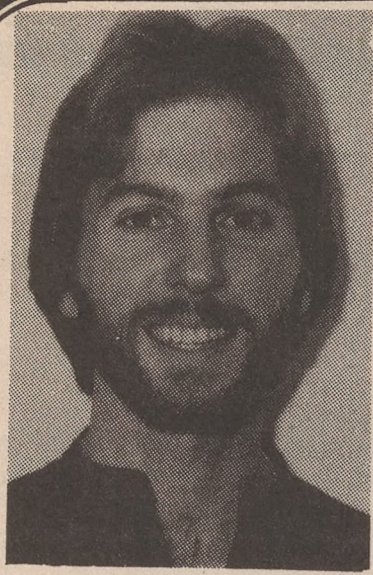
He was appointed to the Regional Planning Commission in 1977 and is also on the board of directors for the Reno YMCA.

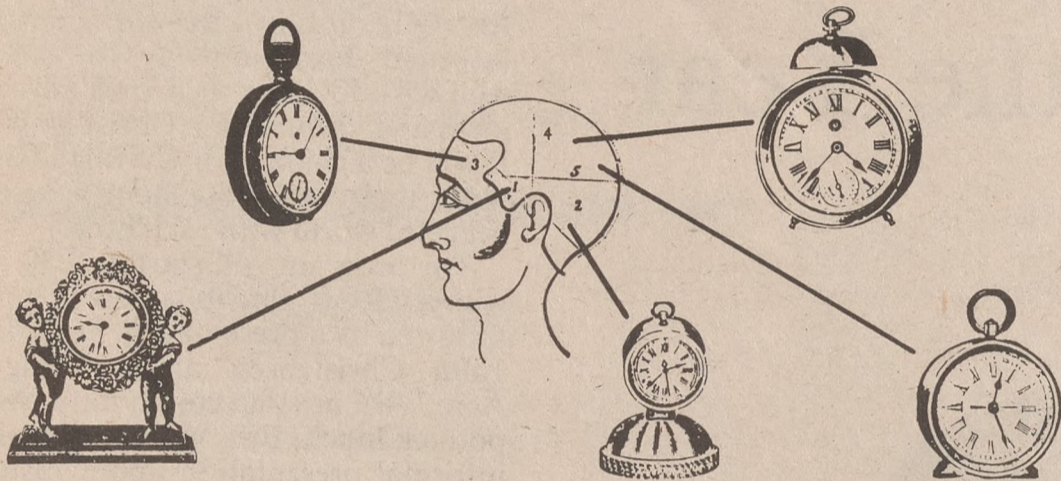

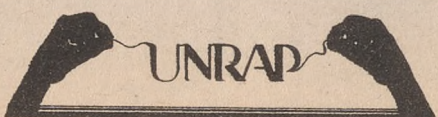

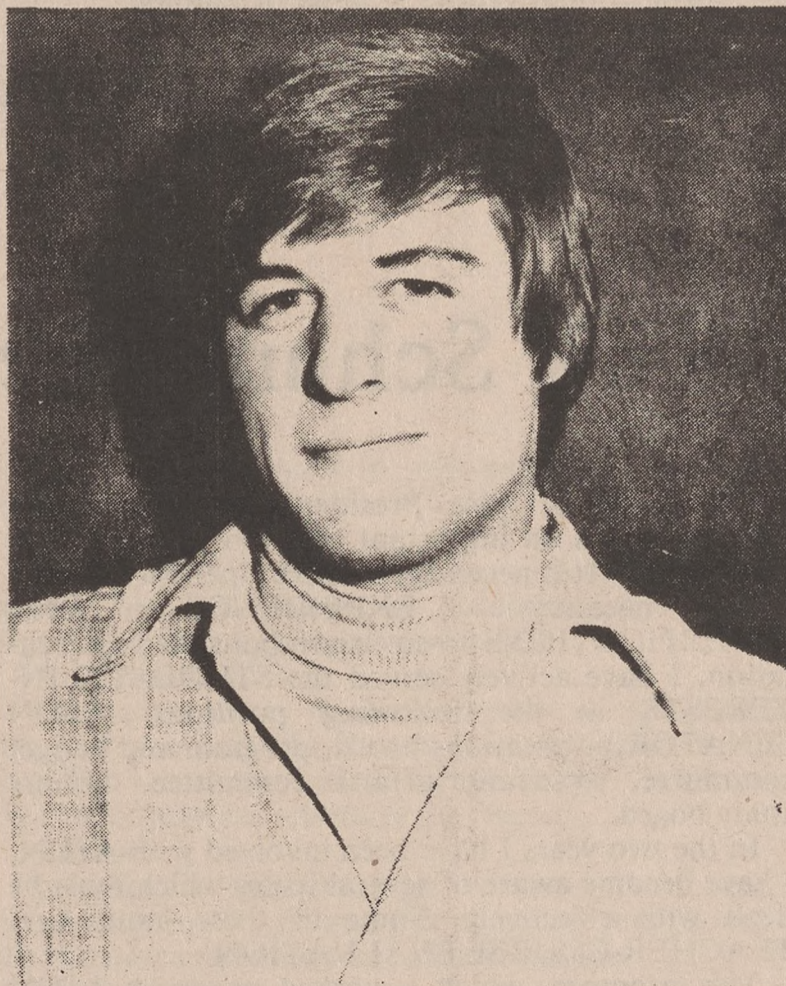

By being a senator during the last year, I have noticed many problems with ASUN. It has the potential to be a strong organization that caters to the majority of students instead of a minority. ASUN has provided many good services and activities during the past few years, but I believe ASUN is not changing with the demands of the students.

My platform consists mainly of reviewing and changing ASUN to meet the needs of more students, but changing ASUN is not something that can be done overnight. I plan on reviewing each board and program within the ASUN to see if the money is being spent where it could do the most good for the most students. I will gather information from other universities to see if their governments have programs we could institute and benefit from; ASUN must consistently compare itself to other student governments so as to see if we are being as effective as possible. I am not saying ASUN has to be drastically changed or restructured, it simply needs review so as to keep it in line with the students needs.

As student body president, I will not only investigate student and university problems (like the Virginia Street crosswalk problem) but I will also bring up new ideas and programs to ASUN. A few of the many ideas I have are listed below:

SET UP A LIBRARY SUPPORT FUND: Since you have no choice in paying for ASUN, then your money should be spent in areas where you will get the benefits you deserve. The library is the one spot that every student on campus uses and it is time ASUN starts to support this part of the university.

SET UP A BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS IMPROVEMENT FUND: Instead of just talking about the problems of dormitory, dining, parking and grounds conditions, ASUN should help improve these parts of our university by setting up a fund specifically for this purpose.

MAKE THE YEARBOOK OPTIONAL: Yearbooks are paid for by this system at many other universities and I believe that if you don't want a yearbook you shouldn't have to pay for it. An extra fee could be charged at registration for those who desire a yearbook and in this way the yearbook staff would know exactly how many yearbooks to purchase, and at what price.

EXTEND CHILDCARE SERVICES AND EXPLORE PROGRAMS FOR OFF CAMPUS STUDENTS: Since 65 percent of UNR's students live off campus, I think ASUN should investigate new programs that will cater to this group.

If elected, I will support USUNS and its lobbyist as it is our major link to the legislature and the budget. I will also support our current strong programs like the teacher-course evaluation and the legal referral service. I believe my one year on senate gives me the experience necessary for the job and I hope you will support me so that ASUN will be reviewed for your benefit.

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V.P. Finance & Publications

I'm Heidi Waterman and I'd like to be your next Vice President of Finance and Publications.

I view the office of Vice President of Finance and Publications as one which requires discretion in planning a budget and distributing monies, diplomacy in dealing with administrators and above all, time and consideration.

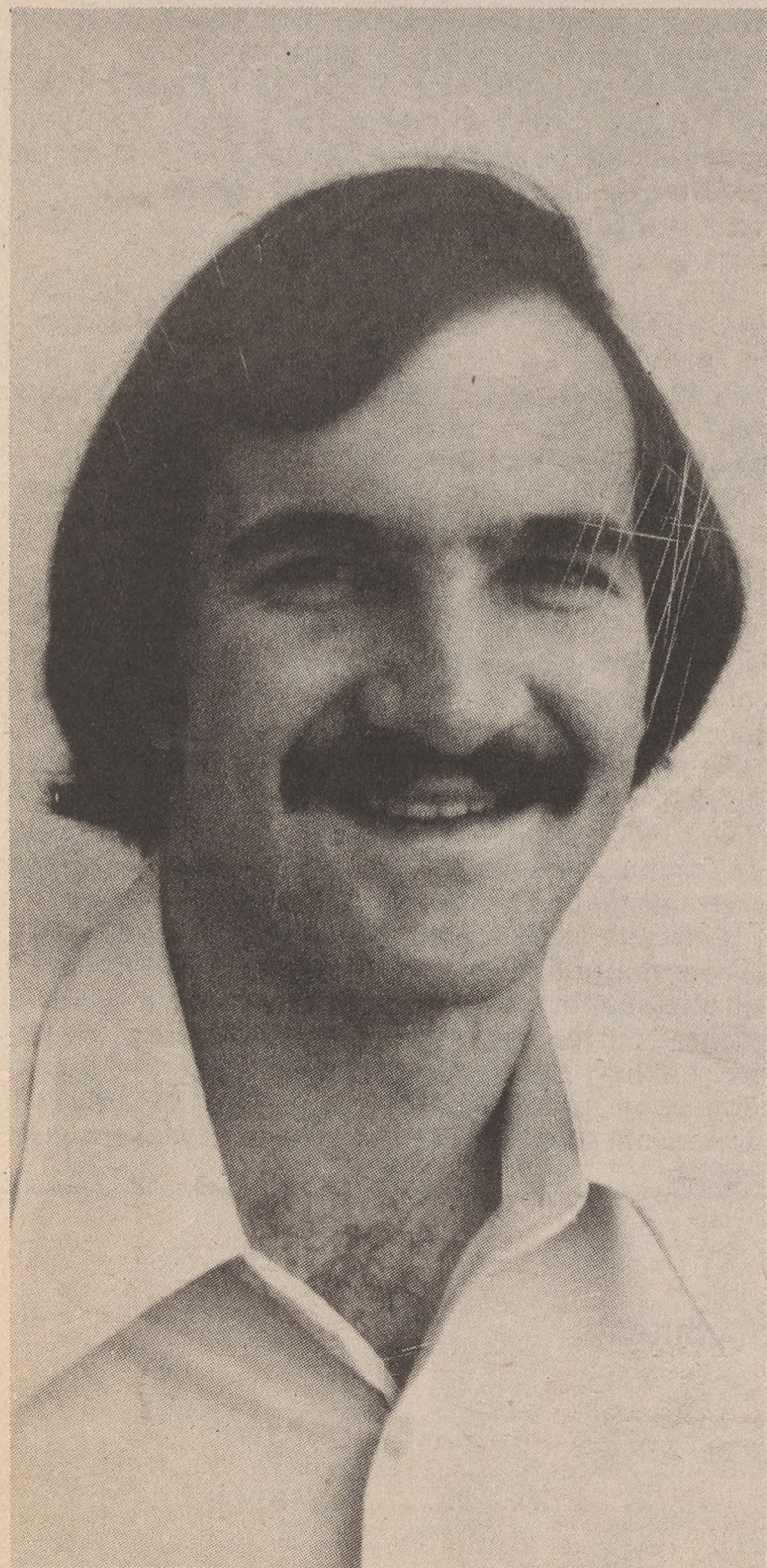

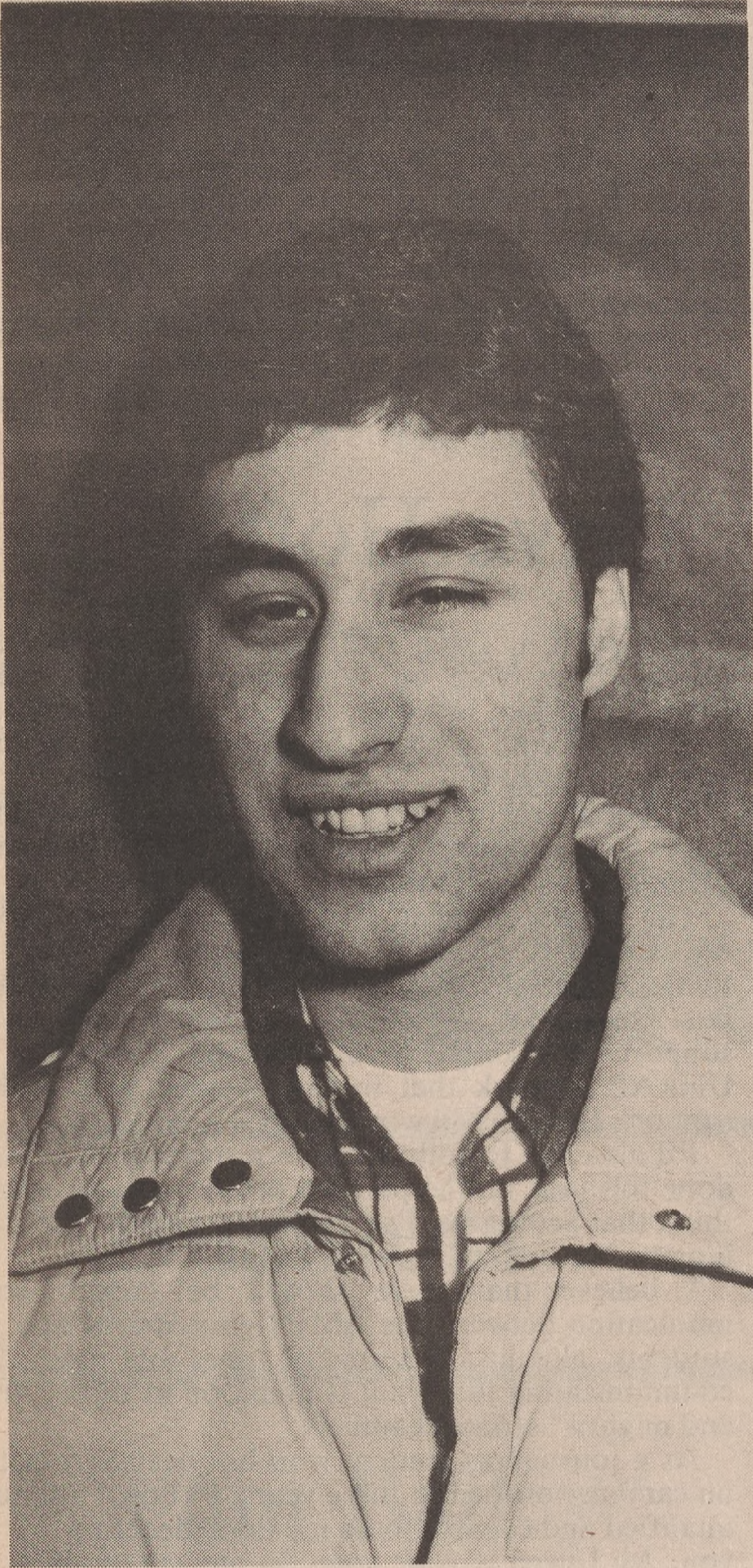
INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS

V.P. Activities

Billy Flangas



Student participation in university activities recently has been limited and unenthusiastic. This seeming lack of interest can be attributed to three major problem areas:

1. The variety and scope of university activities offered are not appealing to the student body as a whole.

2. The publicity for the activities is inadequate and results in a failure to inform a large percentage of the student population properly.

3. Many of the activities provided are aimed at students over the age of 21 and those who are under 21 cannot fully enjoy or participate in them. If university-sponsored activities are to be more successful these problem areas are going to have to be faced and solved.

Every student pays a certain amount of fees which support university activities. Every student, in turn, should be able to contribute some input concerning the type of events planned. This student input should be an ongoing process, whereby student ideas and opinions should be evaluated continuously and incorporated into the decisions of the Activities Board. Only in this way can the ever-changing interests of the student population be served. It then becomes necessary to maintain an open-door policy so that students or student groups may air their views and have some amount of influence into the type of events offered.

Concerts are always a major event to consider. The quality and variety of musical performances has not appealed to many of the students. In Nevada some of the top entertainment is present. With the shortage of promoters in the Reno area there arises a need to consider promoting our own concerts or to possibly consider dealing with entertainment directors of the local clubs.

University-sponsored dances are another event to discuss. In the recent past there have not been any dances sponsored by the university. Semi-formal dances and other types of dances contribute to the total college experience.

Here at UNR, there are several "major weeks," such as Winter Carnival and Mackay Days. In the

past, many of the activities planned for these times have not been entirely successful. One solution to this problem would be to have the plans for these "major weeks" completed with sufficient time to allow for better and more widespread publicity.

Other activities which are presently held but which could use further careful evaluation are the schedule of lectures, scheduling and types of free movies shown and the continuing of special events such as bands in the Manzanita Bowl on sunny afternoons.

The Vice President of Activities has other functions besides acting as Chairman of the Activities Committee. The Vice President of Activities is also an active member of the Executive Council. In this capacity I would like to be instrumental in instituting a committee that will specialize in helping the student to discover and utilize the proper channels in solving his problems.

I sincerely urge all of you to exercise your vote on Wednesday and Thursday and would appreciate your support.

As a student in the field of speech communications I have taken an active role, not only in student government, but also in campus activities. This past year I was a senator for the College of Arts and Science and served on the following committees: Activities Board, Program and Budget, Community Affairs and the Outstanding Teacher and Senior committees. I was chairman of the 1978 Fall Orientation and am presently chairman of the 1979 ASUN Blood Drive. I am also a member of the student orientation staff, Mackay Misses, Colonels Coeds and Sagens.

The activities sponsored by ASUN are important and necessary elements in the students' university life. They serve not only to entertain the students but also to create and diversify their university experience. I feel organization plays a key role in the planning of programs for ASUN. Some of the ways to improve organization are: (1) developing an events calendar (2) increasing the students' input through surveys, and (3) arranging for more publicity. These improvements could be accomplished through reorganizing the structure of the Activities Board.

I feel the following programs are areas of concern:

Concerts:

With the lack of promoters in the Reno area,

ASUN is going to have to start promoting more of their own concerts.

Dances:

Now is the time for ASUN to sponsor their own dances free of charge to students, with other organizations supplying the beverages.

Showcase Activities:

Arts & Science

One example of this is the Winter Carnival which costs approximately \$500, and yet attracts only about 100 students. It is apparent that a great deal of money is being spent here to entertain a small per-

centage of the student body. Not that I advocate doing away with Winter Carnival, but I would like to see a reapportionment of funds into areas such as CONCERTS, movies and dances in order to attract more participation and enjoyment by a greater number of students.

Another situation in need of attention is parking meter rates and parking citation fines. It is currently more expensive for someone to park on campus in metered areas than it is anywhere else in the Reno-Sparks community. It is also more expensive to receive a parking citation. These are clear out cases of discrimination against the students for which there is no apparent justification. The rates and fines on campus need to be brought into alignment with those in the surrounding community.

Other areas which require attention are the ever-rising cost of textbooks (beyond the rate of inflation) and the condition of the pavement in the student parking areas.

I am ready to listen, willing to help and I would like the chance to represent you.

Terry Garcia

Engineering

By serving as president of Nye Hall I have observed the need to get people involved in activities. The more people participating in any one event, the better that event turns out. This is why I would like to see a separate category of competition in the major weeks, such as Homecoming Week and Winter Carnival Week, for dormitories and independent organizations along with the competition between the fraternities and sororities. Also, student input is important to a representative to help him decide the general feeling and mood of the people he represents. Therefore, I would like to see a suggestion/input box placed in the engineering buildings for engineering students in particular.

I also believe that the engineering organizations such as ASME, ASCE and IEEE are important in developing social activities between people who otherwise would only be students together. ASUN support of these organizations through monetary funds is important and I would support any reasonable budget requests.

On the current issue of the ASUN budget, I would

oppose any attempt to force ASUN to approve its budget every year through administrative channels. This would tie the hands of ASUN representatives and would stifle them from approving new and innovative programs.

As a candidate for engineering senator, I see three issues of primary concern.

Many engineering students do not utilize their ASUN fee by attending ASUN-sponsored events. I suggest that they receive "payback" on their "ASUN dollar" in the form of usable benefits such as funded field trips or some form of monetary support for all engineering societies.

Secondly, the College of Engineering is growing rapidly relative to other colleges in the university. Since 1976, enrollment has increased 15 percent. Over the same time period, enrollment in agriculture decreased 21 percent in medical sciences six percent and in education 13 percent. The current enrollment in engineering (at 571) is also greater than any of these colleges (agriculture 452, medical sciences 504, education 555). Yet, while these other colleges have a smaller (and decreasing) enrollment, they each have two ASUN senators, whereas engineering has *only ONE*. I propose that engineering likewise have two senatorial positions in ASUN.

Finally, I suggest that proposed budget cuts take into account enrollment size as well as special demands. Due to a burgeoning real-world technology and the need for reflection thereof within the academic sphere, the College of Engineering has special budgetary requirements, in addition to the demands imposed by its rising enrollment. Budget cuts should be scaled to reflect these needs in order that the engineering student's education is not unduly compromised.

As your senator, I would work to see that engineering students receive proportional representation, payback on their ASUN dollar, and an education not compromised by disproportionate budget cuts.

Supertramp rejected by promoter Schivo

An excursion to the Bay Area for a weekend or a night can be justified in a number of ways. One can simply get away from it all, enjoy some metropolitan life and the finest in entertainment. That's what I am thinking about — the entertainment — as one of the unique rock bands of today, Supertramp, is scheduled to appear in the Oakland Coliseum arena Thursday, April 5 at 8 p.m.

It will be the closest the band comes to the Reno area. Representatives of the band had a desire to do a show in Reno but the idea was rejected by Michael Schivo of High Sierra Concerts. For Schivo, the decision was based entirely on economics. He felt the band could not draw well in this town, even though the performance would be outstanding. I think people would go out and see them for curiosity's sake, it not to appreciate Supertramp's "sophisto-rock."

The band's sixth album will be forthcoming called "Breakfast In America." Undoubtedly the concert coincides with the release as bands frequently tour to promote new releases.

Supertramp is hot. They have produced three straight solid albums including "Even in the Quietest Moments," "Crisis? What Crisis?" and "Crime of the Century." (Two other obscure LP's — "Supertramp" and "Indelibly Stamped" are seldom seen and heard as import albums.)

"Crime of the Century" was an epic album which established the band. "School," the first track of the first side, has one of the best keyboard jams I have heard. Richard Davies is the man behind the keyboards and along with guitarist-vocalist Roger Hodgson, writes and composes the thematic albums.

Dougie Thompson on the bass and California drummer Bob C. Benberg amplify the beat. Subtle, sincere textures are added by John Anthony Helliwell who plays saxophones, clarinets and other reed instruments. Together, the five collaborate for an appealing sound that endures.

Most recently the band enjoyed its biggest success with "Even In The Quietest Moments," an album that went platinum. "Give A Little Bit" has nice acoustical guitar riffs and pleasant vocals from Hodgson and Helliwell's sax is again soothing. Davies shines on "From Now On" which features his acoustic piano.

The guys produced the LP themselves in 1977 and



it was followed by a concert tour and a stop in the Bay Area. A witness told me Supertramp was technically and acoustically great in its presentation.

Although the concert is on a Thursday night, it happens to be a day before our long-awaited highly anticipated spring vacation. You might want to get a head start and get out of town and see a quality show.

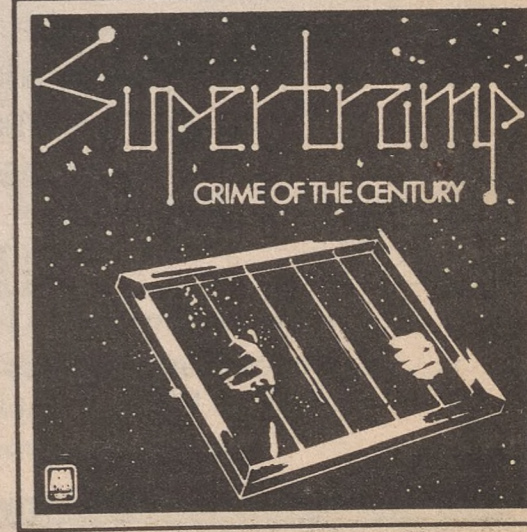
It is unfortunate, however, that we would have to travel four hours by car to see a quality show. I've just heard the first promos for High Sierra Concert's two new shows, the J. Geils Band and U.F.O. (for the end of March and first of April) and these are merely mainstream music-makers who appeal to the abundance of high schoolers in this area.

I'd like to see ASUN get someone worthy to come play for us college kids, Supertramp for instance. There is no way they can be classified as run-of-the-

Films provide rare opportunity

A rare opportunity to view highly regarded foreign and classic films in this area will arrive next week. The Graduate Student Association will present four films to be shown at Scrugham Engineering and Mines Auditorium, Room 101. All films begin at 7 p.m. There is no admission charge.

"Faces" by John Cassevetes, 1968, will be shown March 19. This brilliant film concerns specifically the lives of a young couple, as well as the lives of us all. It illuminates the deterioration of a marriage in a harsh, but sensitive fashion. "Faces" is complex, often frustrating and mercilessly real.

"Hiroshima Mon Amour" by Alain Resnais, 1959, will be shown March 20. His first feature film, it is a powerful portrait of two people, haunted by dark memories, seeking escape in a fleeting love affair. It is brief, but passionate. They are trapped by their remembrances of the past, and are living without hope for the future.

"Jules and Jim" by Francois Truffaut, 1961, will be shown March 22. Joyous, lively, with a touch of romantic nostalgia, the film illuminates a woman, amoral and classically beautiful, who loves two fraternal friends and must have them both even if she must die to do so. For her, no commitment is forever and only death is final.

"A Man and A Woman" by Claude Lelouch, 1966, will be shown March 23 and is the final film of the series. A warm, romantic portrayal of two people who fall in love despite personal tragedy, it is forthright in a "love conquers all" scheme.

Big donate

The Anaconda company donated an air compressor valued at \$17,500 to the Mackay School of Mines, UNR, and the equipment will play an important role in gearing up the school's new field lab.

Anaconda closed its Yerington operation last year after some 20 years and is currently selling its equipment.

Mining dean Arthur Baker said when Anaconda learned the compressor could help open the mining school's newly acquired Commonwealth Mine, the company contacted Baker and offered to donate it.

Air compressors drive drills used in the kind of underground mining students will be studying in the school's new instruction and research facility located south of Reno.

Baker explained Anaconda had overhauled the compressor with an eye toward selling it, so it will be delivered to the school's mine lab in like-new condition.

He said Mark Nesbitt, former manager of the Anaconda mine and a member of the school's advisory council, was instrumental in helping get the compressor.

Anaconda opened in response to need for copper during the Korean Conflict and closed when the ore body became exhausted.

Baker said the mine's closing will be an educational loss for the Mackay School of Mines. It provided on-site learning experiences for mining students and members of the community who signed up for special summer courses in mining appreciation.

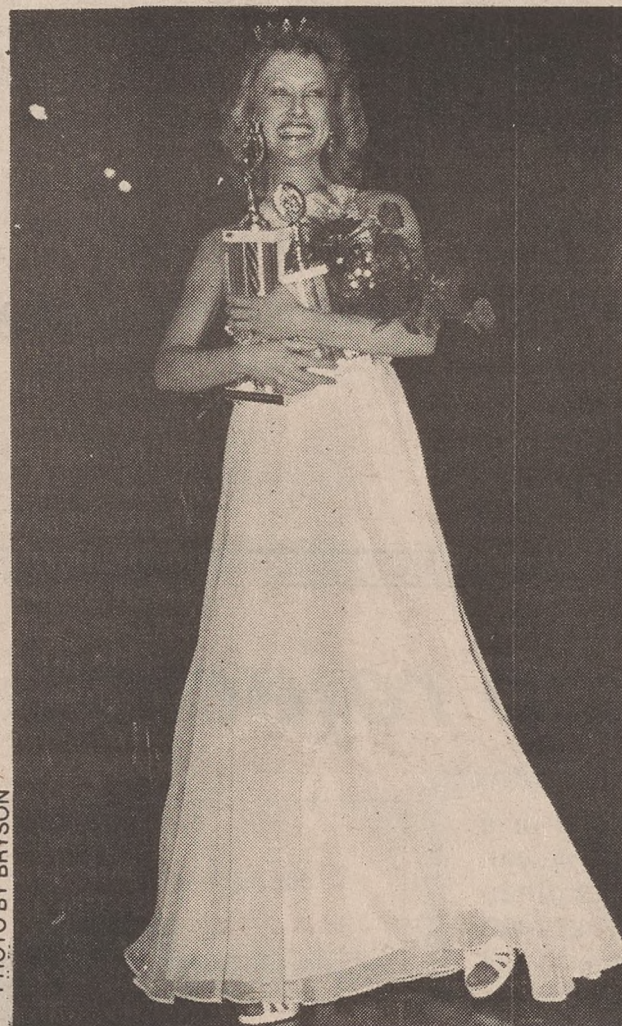


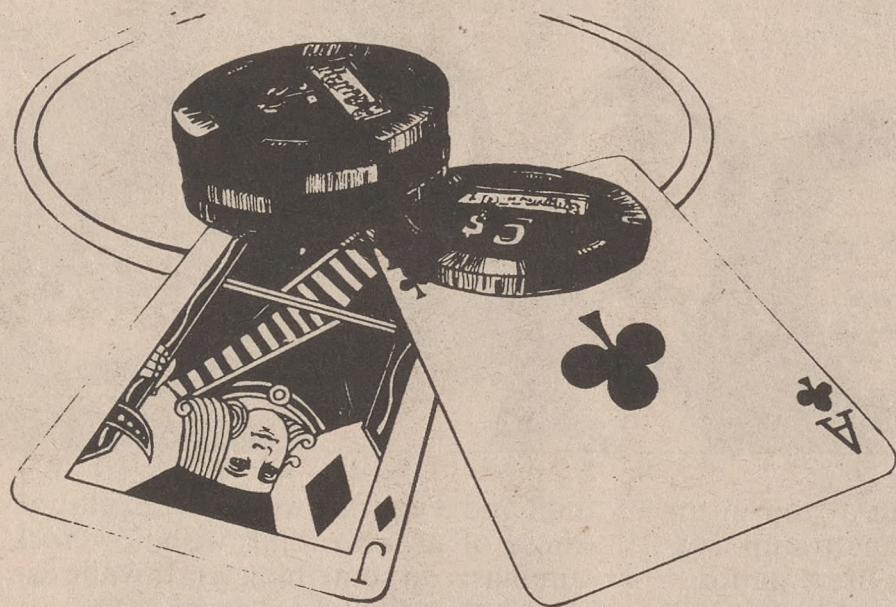

Dr. Horner is provost and academic vice president at Illinois State University.



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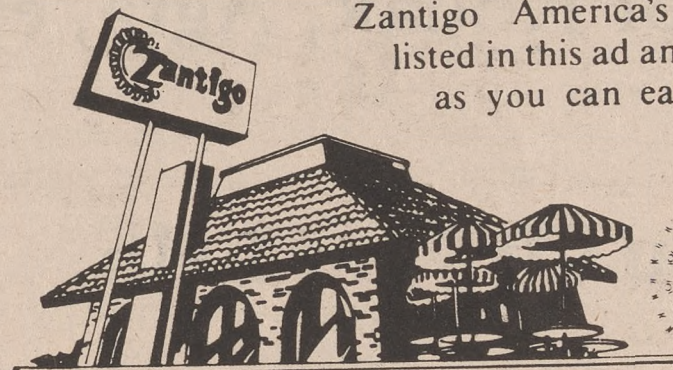

Long season ends

No Big Apple for the Wolf Pack! Horrible foul shooting, questionable officiating and bad ballhandling, led to UNR's downfall in last night's 67-64 loss to Texas A&M in the second round NIT game.

The Pack's hopes for a trip to the NIT finals in New York fell short and ended in controversy before 6,300 vociferous fans at the Centennial Coliseum.

The Wolf Pack made only 14 of their 29 free throws and turned the ball over 19 times. Their 48 per cent free throw percentage was complemented by their even more atrocious 35 per cent field goal percentage.

"The free throws and the turnovers," said UNR coach Jim Carey, "were the things that killed us."

The Aggies were as poor as UNR on the foul line (15 of 31) and barely better from the field (26 of 61, 42 per cent). The Pack did manage to rebound Texas 56 to 41.

Guards Johnny High and Mike Gray led UNR in scoring with 18 a piece. Center Edgar Jones had 15 points and a game-high 20 rebounds. Forward Mike Stallings had 16 rebounds for UNR.

Aggie forward Vernon Smith was high scorer with 20 points. The Aggies, 24-8, advance into the third round of the NIT. The Pack finishes the season at 21-7, the first 20-victory season since the school began playing Division I basketball 12 years ago.

UNR fell behind 67-57 with 1:04 left, but rallied to within three at 67-64 with 11 seconds remaining and Jones on the line shooting one and one. He missed and with seven seconds to go, the Aggies called time out.

According to the official scorers book, the Aggies had used their fifth and final timeout with 13 seconds left when forward Rynn Wright was called for walking and was injured doing it. At that time, the timeout was assessed against Texas. That is how it stood until the Aggie timeout at the seven second mark which, according to the scorebook, was their sixth.

One official technical foul on the Aggies and the other went over to consult with the official scorer. The time out at the 13 second mark was ruled an injury timeout and not counted against A&M's total.

Carey went into a rage, screaming at the officials. During the argument a fan ran onto the court and tried to get at the refs. He was restrained by security guards.

If the technical would have been called on the Aggies, then the Pack would have one free throw and possession of the ball with seven seconds left. If the free throw would have been made and a basket followed, then the game would have been tied and probably gone into overtime.

But, Pack fans will never know, for that never came to pass. The officials would not comment on the game when contacted in their dressing room.

Swimmers end perfect season

The UNR women's swim team was crowned AIAW National Small College Champions Saturday after defeating runner-up Drexel College 349-319 in the four-day national meet held at Lombardi Recreation Center. Eighty small colleges participated in the event that began last Wednesday.

UNR, undefeated in the regular season, was led by senior Anne Belikow.

Belikow swept all three breaststroke events and set two national records. Thursday, she swam to a national best 30.82 in the 50-yard breaststroke. Friday, she set her second record, 1:07.78 in the 100 breaststroke. Belikow also won the 200 breaststroke in 2:28.04 and finished second in the 100 individual medley with a time of 1:01.06.

UNR freshman standout Mary Mirch turned in an excellent performance throughout the meet, taking second in the 200 breaststroke and 100 breaststroke, fourth in the 200 individual medley and fifth in the 50 breaststroke.

Senior Karen Petterson contributed greatly to UNR's cause by taking fourth in both the 200 and 100 backstroke and getting a sixth in the 50 backstroke.

UNR's other high finisher was Barbara Buck who swam to a fifth in the

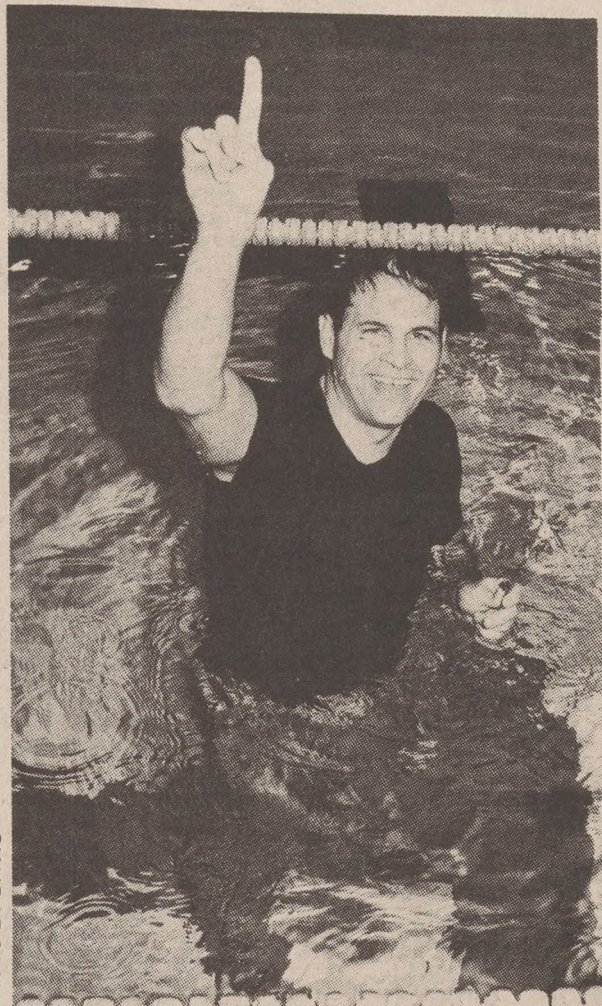

Softball splits two

The UNR softball team finally broke into the win column with a 7-3 victory over Chico State in the second game of a Saturday afternoon double-header at sunny Idlewild Park. In the opener, the Wolf Pack suffered its third straight setback in a 2-0 shutout.

The Pack is now 1-3 for the year while the Wildcats leave Reno with a 1-1 mark.

Reno jumped to a 2-0 lead in the first inning of the nightcap as Kelly Collier opened with a walk. Carlinda Poe singled, and Culverhouse walked to load the bases. Williams then singled to drive in Collier, and Culverhouse scored later on a Rodriguez grounder that forced Williams out at third, allowing Culverhouse to score.

Chico tied the game in the fourth, 2-2 on a run-scoring single by relief pitcher Sally Carless and a throwing error by Williams.

Reno took the lead back in the bottom of the fourth. Collier reached first on an error by shortstop Sheri Grilli and was sacrificed to second by Poe. Culverhouse bounced one to Grilli, who threw wildly to third trying to nail Collier. Collier then scored on a sacrifice bunt by Williams and Pack led 3-2. Consecutive singles by Mecham and Rodriguez produced two more runs and Reno had a 5-2 lead.

After Chico scored an unearned run in the top of the sixth to cut the margin to 5-3, the Pack added two insurance runs in the bottom of the inning. With

one out, Culverhouse hit a bases-empty inside-the-park homerun to make the score 6-3. Williams flied to left for the second out before Mecham singled. Carless walked Rodriguez on four pitches to advance Mecham to second. Carless, now 0-1 after the loss, continued to have control problems and uncorked two wild pitches, enabling Mecham to score, making it 7-3 UNR.

The first game was the same old story for Reno's losing pitcher Debbie Plateau. The hard-luck lefty gave up her first earned run in 16 innings, but, for the second game in a row, the Pack could not score behind her.

Poe picked up her first win of the young season for the Pack as she went the distance to improve her record to 1-1. She allowed one earned run on six hits, struck out two and walked one.

"That first win is the hardest," Plummer said. "It'll be a little easier from now on."

The Pack has this weekend off and will not play again until March 23 in a double-header at the University of Pacific. The Pack then travels to Stanislaus State for another twin bill the next day.

PACK NOTES — The Pack women have only won one game in four tries, but Plateau and Poe have a combined ERA of 0.70. Plateau has given up one earned run in 16 innings for an ERA of 0.44, while Poe has allowed two earned runs in 14 innings for a 1.00 ERA.



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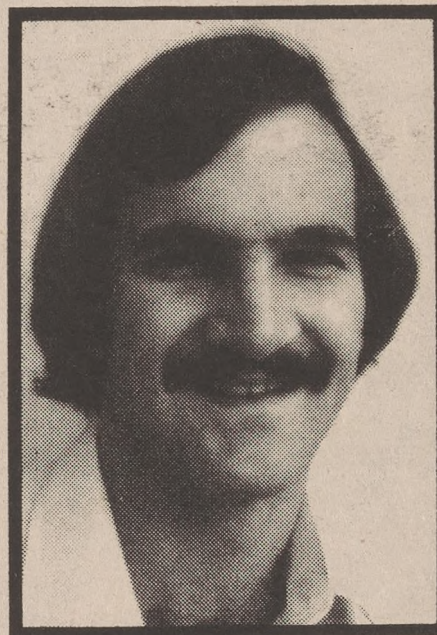
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
